#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Second reading and adoption of Ordinance#2025-\_\_\_\_\_ amending Brawley Municipal Code Chapter 16a for the purpose of adopting a system for registering vacant properties and amending maintenance standards for the same.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The Ordinance aligns Council goals and priorities to establish a clear strategy for addressing vacancies citywide. Council has reached consensus on including incentives and financial penalties to encourage property owners to maintain and improve vacant commercial and residential properties. Staff has presented a comprehensive ordinance that balances property rights with the City's interest in vibrant, attractive neighborhoods.

The Ordinance requires the registration and maintenance of certain real property by mortgagees and vacant property owners; providing for penalties and enforcement, as well as the regulation, limitation, and reduction of abandoned real property. The Ordinance aims to reduce the negative impacts of long-term vacancies and promote productive property use. Staff now presents the Ordinance for the second reading and adoption.

At the first reading of the ordinance, Council indicated that they would like to consider some future revisions of the ordinance. However, it was decided that the ordinance would be adopted as is at this point in order to enable staff to address many of the problem properties in the City.

The City Attorney will research Council's suggestions for revisions and bring the results of that research back to Council at a later time.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The fees associated with the registration and enforcement of this ordinance are intended for cost recovery purposes, should the City Council adopt this Ordinance.

There will be a modest expense incurred for publishing the ordinance after it is passed.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

Direct staff not to proceed with the ordinance at this time.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRAWLEY, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

#### 1. Purpose:

The purpose of this Ordinance is to ensure that all vacant properties within the city limits of the City of Brawley comply with minimum property maintenance requirements, to encourage proactive and preventative maintenance of properties, to ensure maintenance issues are quickly and effectively remedied, and to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City of Brawley.

#### 2. Findings:

The City Council finds that unless vacant properties are well maintained, they can easily become a public nuisance that negatively affect the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City of Brawley.

The City Council further finds that a system of registering vacant properties within the city limits will assist in preventing vacant properties from becoming a public nuisance.

The City Council further finds that the imposition of a modest registration fee will help defer the costs of maintaining the registry and periodic inspections of vacant properties to ensure that they are being properly maintained.

#### 3. Severability.

If any provision of this Ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, that invalidity will not affect the remaining provisions of this Ordinance, which can be implemented without the invalid provisions, and to this end, the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

#### 4. Amendment of Municipal Code.

Chapter 16a of the Brawley Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### CHAPTER 16a.

#### MAINTENANCE AND REGISTRATION OF VACANT PROPERTIES.

#### Sec. 16a.1. Definitions.

For the purposes of this Chapter, the following terms shall have the following definitions:

"Active construction" means construction activities are occurring pursuant to a valid building permit and without any pause, interruption, or suspension greater in duration than 45 days.

"Beneficiary" means a lender under a note secured by a deed of trust or any other party with a recorded interest in the property.

"Deed of trust" means an instrument by which title to real estate is transferred to a third-party trustee as security for a real estate loan.

"Enforcement Official" means the city manager, building official, chief of police, fire chief, or any of their respective designees.

"Evidence of vacancy" means any condition that, on its own, or combined with other conditions present, would lead a reasonable person to believe that a property is vacant. Such conditions include, but are not limited to overgrown or dead vegetation, accumulation of newspapers, circulars, flyers, or mail, past due utility notices or disconnected utilities, accumulation of trash, junk, or debris, the absence of window coverings such as curtains, blinds, or shutters, the absence of furnishings or personal items consistent with habitation, and statements by neighbors, passersby, delivery agents, or government employees that the property is vacant.

"Local" means the area within 40 miles of the subject property.

"Notice of default" means a recorded notice that a default has occurred under a deed of trust and the beneficiary intends to proceed with a trustee's sale.

"Owner" means any person having legal or equitable title or any interest in real property, including any beneficiaries or trustees, any lessee, occupant, or person having charge or control of the building(s), structure(s), or property within the City.

"Trustee" means a person or entity holding a deed of trust on a property.

"Vacant property" means any building, lot, or parcel that has not been occupied or utilized for a period of more than thirty days. A building, lot, or parcel is not vacant if active construction is occurring on the property.

#### Sec. 16a.2. Public nuisance.

- (a) It shall be the duty of each owner or agent thereof to maintain their property.
- (b) The following acts and conditions, when performed or existing upon any lot or parcel within the City, are declared to be unlawful and are defined as and declared to be public nuisances per se that are injurious to the public health, safety, and welfare:
  - i. Buildings, structures, or fences in a state of either partial construction or destruction, except during active construction;
  - ii. Graffiti;
  - iii. Painted surfaces that are peeling, or stuccoed surfaces that are crumbling;
  - iv. Animal droppings;
  - v. Doors and windows that are not closed and securely locked so as to prevent unpermitted access to the structure;
  - vi. Broken windows that are not replaced immediately with glass or boards;
  - vii. Signage, except for those advertising the sale or rental of the property, not removed within sixty days of the cessation of the use associated with the sign, or otherwise properly permitted pursuant to the Brawley Municipal Code; viii. Trash, debris, litter, and junk;
  - ix. Overgrown landscaping or weeds;
  - x. Structures or buildings that are structurally unsound or dangerous;

xi. Violation of any applicable city, county, or state code or regulation.

#### Sec. 16a.3. Declaration of a nuisance.

If a building, lot, or parcel is found to be in conflict with the maintenance standards of this Chapter, an Enforcement Official shall declare said property to be a nuisance.

#### Sec. 16a.4. Emergency abatement.

Any nuisance that poses an immediate threat to the public health, safety, or general welfare shall be abated immediately as directed by an Enforcement Official. Any such abatement activity under this section may be conducted without observance of any notice requirements described in this Chapter.

#### Sec. 16a.5. Non-emergency abatement.

- (a) Upon declaration of a property being a nuisance, the Enforcement Official shall send a notice to abate in writing to the owner of record of the subject property. A copy of the notice shall also be posted on the property.
- (b) Said notice shall provide a brief description of the violations and a deadline for the property owner to abate the nuisance. This deadline shall be at least thirty days from the date of the notice, unless the property or the property owner has had a previous nuisance abated under section 16a.4 or section 16a.5(c), in which case, the deadline shall be at least ten days from the date of the notice.
- (c) The notice shall contain a statement that the determination of nuisance may be appealed as set forth in section 16a.7 of this Chapter.
- (d) The owner may appeal the notice pursuant to provisions of Section 16a.7 of this Chapter If no appeal is received by the City Clerk within fifteen calendar days after service of the notice, the determination shall be deemed final.
- (e) If, after the expiration of the deadline, the nuisance still has not been abated to the satisfaction of the Enforcement Official, they shall request that the City Manager direct the Building Official to abate the nuisance according to law.

Sec. 16a.6. Lien for abatement costs.

- (a) If a nuisance is abated under this Chapter, the Enforcement Official shall keep a full and accurate accounting of all costs associated with said abatement.
- (b) An invoice detailing said costs shall be sent to the owner(s) of the property by the Finance Department requesting payment within thirty days of the date of the invoice. The invoice shall be accompanied by a notice that the cost of abatement may be appealed as set forth in section 16a.7 of this Chapter. If no appeal is received by the City Clerk within fifteen calendar days after service of the invoice, the invoice shall be deemed final.
- (c) If payment is not received by the applicable deadline, a lien or special assessment for the invoice amount shall be levied against the property in accordance with Government Code Sections 38773.1 et seq.

#### Sec. 16a.7. Appeals.

- (a) The responsible party may appeal the determination of nuisance or costs of abatement by filing a written request for a hearing with the City Clerk within fifteen days of the date of the notice to abate or invoice of abatement costs. Such appeal shall be in writing and shall identify the property subject to the notice to abate. The City Manager shall then cause the matter to be set for hearing before a hearing officer contracted by the city to hear such matters pursuant to Chapter 19F of the Brawley Municipal Code.
- (b) Notice of the date of hearing shall be given in writing. The date of the hearing shall conform to the procedure set forth in Section 19F.10.
- (c) At the time fixed in the notice, the contracted hearing officer shall hear the testimony of all competent persons desiring to testify respecting the condition constituting the nuisance or the determination of costs of abatement.
- (d) If the hearing officer so concludes, they may declare the conditions existing to be a nuisance and direct the owner of the property on which the nuisance exists to abate it within ten days after the date of posting on the premises a notice of the hearing officer's order. The hearing officer may grant additional time to abate the nuisance if, in their opinion,

good cause for additional time exists. Additionally, the hearing officer may uphold, deny, or modify the City's determination of costs of abatement.

(e) The decision of the hearing officer on the determination of the nuisance or determination of costs of abatement is final. Any appeal of the hearing officer's decision shall be governed by California Code of Civil Procedure Section 1094.6 or such section as may be amended from time to time.

#### Sec. 16a.8. Prevention of recurring nuisance.

Once a property has been declared a nuisance and said nuisance has been abated, either by the City or by the owner, the Building Official shall place said property on a periodic inspection schedule, the interval of which to be determined by the building official.

#### Sec. 16a.9. Vacant property registration.

- (a) An owner of a vacant property must register their property with the city within ten days of the building, lot, or parcel becoming vacant. Properties shall remain subject to these registration and fee requirements as long as they remain vacant.
- (b) The registration shall contain the names, mailing addresses, and phone numbers for any beneficiary or trustee, and all other known owners. Owners utilizing a local property management company must also include the name, mailing address, and phone number of the local property management company or companies who are responsible for the security and maintenance of the property.
- (c) A registration fee of \$100 shall accompany the registration form. The registration shall be valid for the remainder of the calendar year in which the registration was submitted. Registration fees are nonrefundable and may not be prorated. The registration fee provided for herein may be increased by resolution in the event that the City Council determines that it is insufficient to defray the costs of maintaining the vacant property list and performing periodic inspections.
- (d) Registration must be renewed annually. Renewal registrations and renewal fees are due January 1st of each year and must be received no later than January  $31^{\rm st}$  of the year due.

- (e) Any beneficiary or trustee who holds a deed of trust on a property located with the city shall perform an inspection of the subject property prior to recording a notice of default with the Imperial County recorder's officer. If the subject property is found to be vacant or shows evidence of vacancy, the beneficiary or trustee shall, within 10 days of the inspection, register the property in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.
- (f) Any owner who has registered a property under this Chapter must report any change of the information contained in the registration within 10 days of the change.
- (g) In the event a registered vacant property becomes occupied, the owner shall report the occupation with in 10 days of the same so that the property may be removed from the vacant property list maintained by the City.

#### Sec. 16a.10. Security of vacant properties.

- (a) All vacant properties shall be maintained in a manner which secures the property from any unauthorized entry. This shall include, but is not limited to, repairing walls and fences, chaining or padlocking gates, and repairing and/or boarding doors, windows, or other openings.
- (b) An owner, or their agent, must inspect the vacant property on a monthly basis. If unable to do so, owners of vacant properties must retain a local property management company licensed to do business in the City. The local property management company must be contracted to perform monthly inspections of the vacant property to ensure compliance with the Brawley Municipal Code. If the local property management company determines that the vacant property is not in compliance with any provision of the Brawley Municipal Code, the property management company shall notify the owner(s) and the property shall be immediately brought back into compliance.
- (c) All vacant properties registered under this Chapter shall be posted with the name and 24-hour contact phone number of the owner and/or local property management company. The posting shall be no less than eighteen inches by twenty-four inches, shall contain the phrases "THIS PROPERTY MANAGED BY" and "TO REPORT PROBLEMS OR CONCERNS CALL", and shall be of a font that is legible from the street. The posting shall be placed on the interior of a window facing the street so that the posting is visible from the street. If no such window exists,

the posting must be constructed of weather-resistant materials and posted in a location that is visible from the street.

#### Sec. 16a.11. Enforcement.

- (a) It is unlawful and declared a public nuisance per se to violate any provision of this Chapter.
- (b) A violation of any provision of this Chapter constitutes a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000, or by imprisonment in the County jail not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each and every day that a violation is maintained, caused, suffered, or permitted to exist is a separate offense.
- (c) A violation of any provision of this Chapter is subject to civil citations, penalties, fees, and costs as further described in Chapter 19F of this Code.
- (d) The provisions of this Chapter are nonexclusive, and are supplementary to existing rights and remedies. The provisions of this Chapter may be enforced by any remedies provided for in this Code or otherwise available by law.
- (e) The duties and liabilities specified in this Chapter are joint and several among and between all owners.

#### 5. Effective Date:

This ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) days after its adoption and the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy, or summary of this ordinance to be published one time within fifteen (15) days after its adoption in a newspaper of general circulation printed in Imperial County and circulated in the City of Brawley.

<u>Section 2</u>: The City Council of the City of Brawley finds that buildings and lots that are neither utilized nor properly maintained are potentially hazardous to life and limb,

<u>Section 3:</u> The City Council of the City of Brawley hereby adds to the Municipal Code of the City of Brawley, Chapter <u>Maintenance of Abandoned Buildings or Vacant Property</u> as shown in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Section 4: This ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) days after its adoption and the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of this ordinance to be published one time within fifteen (15) days after its adoption in the Imperial Valley Press, a newspaper of general circulation printed in Imperial County and circulated in the City of Brawley.

PROPOSED ABANDONED BUILDING ORDINANCE

#### Sec. \*1 Definitions

Abandoned Buildings shall mean building(s) structure(s) that have not been occupied or utilized for sixty days, so as to constitute such building or portion thereof an attractive nuisance or hazard to the public.

<u>Vacant lots</u> shall mean lot(s) or parcel(s) that do not have structure(s) upon them and are not being utilized for legitimate purpose authorized by the current owner of record, so as to constitute such property or portion thereof or attractive nuisance or hazard to the public.

#### Sec. \*2 Duties of Property Owner

It shall be the duty of each property owner or agent thereof to maintain his or her property and all structures and improvements thereon. Maintenance standards shall include but not be limited to not leaving buildings in a state of either partial construction or destruction, keeping exterior surfaces free of graffiti; not allowing painted surfaces to be peeling nor allowing stuccoed surfaces to be crumbling; animal droppings (including, but not limited to bird and rodent) shall not be allowed to accumulate; all doors and windows shall be closed and securely locked so as to prevent illegal access to the structure; all broken windows shall be replaced immediately with glass or boards, foil or newspaper shall not be used in this capacity; all signage (except for those advertising the sale or rental of the property) shall be removed within sixty days of the cessation of the use associated with the sign; fences shall not be left in state of partial construction or destruction and they shall be free of graffiti; the premises shall be kept free of rubbish, debris, and weeds; and all landscaping shall be properly trimmed.

#### Sec. \*3 Declaration of a Nuisance

If a parcel and/or its structure(s) are found to be in conflict with the maintenance standards of this chapter, the City Building Official shall declare said property to be a nuisance.

#### Sec. \*4 Abatement of said Nuisance

- A) Any nuisance that poses a serious risk to life or limb, shall be abated immediately as directed by the Fire Chief or Building Official.
- B) Upon declaration of a property being a nuisance the Building Official shall send notice in writing to the owner of record of the subject property. Said notice shall grant the property owner fifteen days

from the date of the letter to abate the nuisance. A copy of the letter shall also be posted on the property.

- C) If the nuisance is not abated to the satisfaction of the Building Official, a second notice requesting abatement of the nuisance within fifteen days of the date of the letter shall be sent to the property owner and posted on the property.
- D) If the nuisance still has not been abated to the satisfaction of the Building Official, he or she shall request that the City Manager direct the Building Official to abate the nuisance using City, contract, and/or volunteer resources.

#### Sec. \* 5 Lien for Abatement Costs

If the City abates a nuisance, the Building Official shall keep a full accounting of all costs associated with said abatement. An invoice detailing said costs shall be sent to the property owner by the Finance Department requesting payment within thirty days of the date of the invoice.

If payment is not received by the deadline, a lien for the invoice amount shall be levied against the property in accordance with Government Code Section 38773.1.

#### Sec. \* 6 Prevention of Recurring Nuisance

Once a property has been declared a nuisance and had said nuisance abated, either by the City or by the owner, the Building Official shall place said property on a periodic inspection schedule, the interval of which to be determined by the Building Official.

#### Sec. \* 7 Additional Occurrences of a Nuisance

- A) If the subject property had its previous nuisance abated by the owner, the Building Official shall follow the abatement procedures as prescribed in Section \*.4 et seq. of this Chapter.
- B) If the subject property had its previous nuisance abated by the City, or its designees, the Building Official shall send a notice to the property owner requesting abatement of said nuisance within ten days of the date of the notice. A copy of said notice shall be posted on the property. If the nuisance is not abated to the satisfaction of the Building Official, he or she shall follow the procedures as described in Section \*.4D et seq of this Chapter.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

- 2) Authorize the City Manager and Police Chief, or their designees, to accept the grant award on behalf of the City of Brawley; and
- 3) Authorize the City Manager and Police Chief, or their designees, to execute all grant agreements and other required documents, and take any actions necessary to implement such grant agreements and related documents.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) has authorized the City of Brawley's application for funding under the FY 2025-2026 OTS Grant Program in the amount of \$80,000.00. The City's approved proposal is for the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP), which focuses on reducing traffic collisions, injuries, and fatalities through targeted enforcement and educational strategies.

The OTS STEP Grant will fund overtime operations dedicated to proven traffic enforcement methods and community education efforts, including but not limited to:

- Driving under the influence (DUI) and California Driver's License checkpoints;
- Distracted driving and speeding saturation patrols; and
- Educational programs and public awareness campaigns to promote safe driving behaviors.

The strategies supported by this grant are designed to utilize best practices to reduce the number of persons killed or injured in crashes involving alcohol, distraction, and other primary collision factors. These high-visibility enforcement efforts are expected to generate community awareness and media attention, enhancing deterrence and compliance with traffic laws.

In addition to enforcement, the Brawley Police Department will participate in community outreach and collaboration efforts to engage residents in traffic safety discussions and promote education and awareness across the community.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The City's FY25/26 Operating Budget did not include the additional revenues and expenditures associated with the implementation of the OTS STEP Grant. Therefore, a budget adjustment is recommended to recognize the grant's revenues and appropriate the corresponding expenditures.

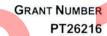

#### 1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

#### Describe the city, county, or jurisdiction this grant will impact.

The City of Brawley, located in Imperial County, California, is a growing community that serves as a major transportation hub in the southernmost region of the state. With a population of approximately 26,227 residents, Brawley is centrally positioned within the county and experiences heavy commuter traffic due to its proximity to Arizona and Mexico.

The city is intersected by three major highways—Highway 86, Highway 111, and Highway 78, which contributes to a high volume of traffic. This heavy traffic leads to roadway congestion and safety concerns. Additionally, Brawley attracts winter visitors, further increasing traffic flow during peak seasons.

The city's jurisdiction includes nine schools, with over 5,700 students who walk or commute daily, requiring strong traffic safety enforcement to protect pedestrians and young commuters. However, the Brawley Police Department (BPD) has been operating with limited resources, consisting of only 12 full-time patrol officers and four supervisors, with an average of three officers patrolling the city per shift. Due to staffing and budget constraints, the department's dedicated traffic enforcement unit was disbanded in 2016, leaving general patrol officers responsible for handling all traffic-related concerns. This has resulted in limited proactive enforcement and increased traffic complaints, particularly regarding speeding, school zone safety, pedestrian violations, and DUI-related incidents.

# Describe the problem(s) to be addressed, supported by current and relevant crash data. (most recent calendar year data/stats).

Traffic safety in Brawley has become a growing concern, with data from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) showing a significant increase in fatal and injury crashes over recent years. Between 2019 and 2020, the city experienced an 80% rise in total crashes, ranking 50th out of 91 comparable cities. Additionally, DUI-related arrests and nighttime crashes remain a persistent issue, with young adult drivers (ages 21–34) disproportionately involved in serious or fatal crashes. The BPD has identified unsafe speed, failure to yield, and improper turning as the top three primary factors contributing to crashes, further emphasizing the need for targeted traffic enforcement efforts.

The City of Brawley is facing a significant increase in traffic safety concerns, with a growing number of fatal and injury-related crashes, particularly involving speeding, failure to yield, and DUI incidents. According to the most recent crash data, unsafe speed was the leading cause of crashes in 2023, accounting for nine reported crashes, while failure to yield and improper turning contributed to six crashes. Additionally, alcohol involvement was a factor in three crashes, highlighting the ongoing risk posed by impaired drivers. These numbers indicate a persistent and urgent need for enhanced traffic enforcement measures to address reckless driving behaviors and improve roadway safety.

Historical data further supports this trend, showing a sharp increase in fatal and injury crashes between 2019 and 2020, with incidents rising from 23 to 42—a staggering 80% increase. The California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) ranked Brawley 50th out of 91 comparable cities for total fatal and injury crashes, demonstrating a worsening safety environment. While total crashes showed a decline from 72 in 2020 to 31 in 2022, there was an alarming increase in fatal crashes, rising from one in 2020 to three in 2021, with two additional fatalities in 2022. Further analysis is needed to determine the factors contributing to these fluctuations, but the rise in fatal crashes underscores the need for targeted enforcement strategies to prevent further loss of life.

DUI-related crashes remain a critical issue, with Brawley consistently ranking in the top 25% of comparable cities for DUI arrests. Despite a decrease in overall DUI arrests from 40 in 2019 to 19 in 2020, the incidence of fatal and injury crashes during nighttime hours (9:00 PM – 2:59 AM) increased significantly. This suggests that impaired driving remains a serious concern, requiring enhanced DUI checkpoints, public awareness campaigns, and strict enforcement of traffic laws. The combination of high crash rates, DUI involvement, and

limited enforcement resources has resulted in an ongoing safety crisis on Brawley's roads, placing pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists at risk.

In 2024, the top three primary crash factors were speed, failure to yield, and improper turning. Speed contributed to one fatal crash that resulted in four deaths, as well as five additional crashes that caused injuries to nine individuals. Failure to yield was responsible for one fatal crash with one death, along with 19 additional crashes that resulted in 24 injuries. Improper turning accounted for six crashes, leading to injuries for eight people. These patterns show a concerning trend that continues to put lives at risk and highlight the urgent need for focused safety efforts.

With only three patrol officers on duty per shift, the Brawley Police Department lacks the capacity for proactive traffic enforcement, further exacerbating the problem. Traffic-related complaints, including speeding in school zones, pedestrian violations, and aggressive driving, continue to compete with emergency calls and routine patrol duties, limiting the department's ability to address violations before they result in crashes. Without dedicated resources, these preventable crashes will continue to rise, endangering residents and visitors alike. To combat these concerning trends, the Brawley Police Department continues to target enforcement operations, DUI prevention initiatives, and enhanced officer training, all aimed at reducing traffic crashes, improving road safety, and saving lives.

Define the target population the grant intends to serve and how they are affected by the problem(s). The target population for Brawley Police department includes the 26,227 residents of Brawley, as well as commuters, school children, pedestrians, cyclists, and other drivers who navigate the city's roadways daily. With nine schools in the jurisdiction and over 5,700 students who walk or commute to and from school, children and young pedestrians are among the most vulnerable to traffic-related dangers. Speeding in school zones and along major thoroughfares has been a persistent concern, with limited law enforcement resources available to provide consistent oversight. Without increased enforcement, students, parents, and school staff remain at risk of preventable crashes due to reckless driving behaviors, such as speeding, failure to yield, and distracted driving.

The city's position as a regional transportation hub also means that commuters traveling between California, Arizona, and Mexico frequently pass through Brawley. The presence of Highways 86, 111, and 78 creates heavy traffic congestion, which increases the likelihood of speed-related and failure-to-yield crashes. These road conditions place local drivers at risk of crashes, which often result in severe injuries or fatalities.

Additionally, DUI-related crashes and nighttime crashes disproportionately affect younger drivers aged 21-34, a demographic that ranks among the highest in fatal and injury crashes in Brawley. Impaired driving remains a major concern, with alcohol-involved crashes contributing to serious injuries and fatalities. The community as a whole faces increased risk due to limited proactive enforcement, meaning DUI offenders may continue to drive under the influence without intervention. Residents who commute during nighttime hours—such as shift workers, emergency responders, and service industry employees—are particularly vulnerable to the dangers posed by intoxicated or reckless drivers.

Through targeted enforcement and education programs, the Brawley police department will help prevent future crashes, protect at-risk populations, and create a safer road environment for everyone in the city. These efforts will directly benefit all members of the Brawley community by reducing the likelihood of fatal and injury crashes, increasing school zone safety, DUI enforcement, and pedestrian protections, and enhancing traffic safety for both local and commuter populations.

#### 3. METHOD OF PROCEDURE

## A. Phase 1 - Program Preparation (1st Quarter of Grant Year)

- The department will develop operational plans to implement the "best practice" strategies outlined in the objectives section.
- Conduct all training needed to implement the program, in the first quarter.
- Purchase all grant related supplies and materials to implement the program, in the first quarter.
- Items with a unit cost of \$5,000 more (including tax and shipping) must comply with Buy America.
- In order to develop/maintain the "DUI BOLOs," research will be conducted to identify the "worst of
  the worst" repeat DUI offenders with a suspended or revoked license as a result of DUI
  convictions. The DUI BOLO may include the driver's name, last known address, DOB,
  description, current license status, and the number of times suspended or revoked for DUI. DUI
  BOLOs should be updated and distributed to traffic and patrol officers at least monthly.
- Implementation of the STEP grant activities will be accomplished by deploying personnel at high crash locations.

#### Media Requirements

Issue a news release approved by the OTS PIO announcing the kick-off of the grant by December 31 and after the grant is signed and executed, but no sooner than October 1, the start of the grant year. The kick-off release must be approved by the OTS PIO. If you are unable to meet the December 31 deadline to issue a kick-off press release, communicate reasons to your OTS grant coordinator and OTS PIO.

## B. Phase 2 - Program Operations (Throughout Grant Year)

#### Media Requirements

The following requirements are for all grant-related activities:

- Send all media advisories, alerts, videos, graphics, artwork, posters, radio/PSA/video scripts, storyboards, digital and/or print educational materials for grant-related activities to the OTS PIO at <a href="mailto:pio@ots.ca.gov">pio@ots.ca.gov</a> for approval and copy your OTS grant coordinator.   training courses are EXEMPT from the approval process.
- The OTS PIO is responsible for the approval of the design and content of materials. The agency
  understands OTS PIO approval is not authorizing approval of budget expenditure or cost. Any
  cost approvals must come from the OTS grant coordinator.
- Pre-approval is not required when using any OTS-supplied template for media advisories, news
  releases, social media graphics, videos or posts, or any other OTS-supplied educational material.
  However, copy the OTS PIO at <a href="mailto:pio@ots.ca.gov">pio@ots.ca.gov</a> and your OTS grant coordinator when any
  material is distributed to the media and public, such as a news release, educational material, or
  link to social media post.
- If an OTS-supplied template, educational material, social media graphic, post or video is substantially changed, the changes shall be sent to the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> for approval and copy your OTS grant coordinator.
- News releases, social media posts and alerts on platforms such as NextDoor and Nixle reporting immediate and time-sensitive grant activities (e.g. enforcement operations, day of event highlights or announcements, event invites) are EXEMPT from the OTS PIO approval process.

The OTS PIO and your OTS grant coordinator should still be notified when the grant-related activity is happening (e.g. car seat checks, bicycle rodeos, community presentations, DUI checkpoints, etc.).

- Enforcement activities such as warrant and probation sweeps, court stings, etc. that are
  embargoed or could impact operations by publicizing in advance are EXEMPT from the PIO
  approval process. However, announcements and results of activities should still be copied to the
  OTS PIO at pio@ots.ca.gov and your OTS grant coordinator with the embargoed date and time
  or with "INTERNAL ONLY: DO NOT RELEASE" message in subject line of email.
- Any earned or paid media campaigns for TV, radio, digital or social media that are part of a specific grant objective, using OTS grant funds, or designed and developed using contractual services by a subgrantee, requires prior approval.
- Social media posts highlighting state or national traffic safety campaigns (Distracted Driving Month, Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month, etc.), enforcement operations (DUI checkpoints, etc.), or any other grant-related activity such as Bicycle rodeos, presentations, or events, are highly encouraged but do not require prior approval.
- Submit a draft or rough-cut of all digital, printed, recorded or video material (brochures, posters, scripts, artwork, trailer graphics, digital graphics, social posts connected to an earned or paid media campaign grant objective) to the OTS PIO at <a href="mailto:pio@ots.ca.gov">pio@ots.ca.gov</a> and copy your OTS grant coordinator for approval prior to the production or duplication.
- Use the following standard language in all press, media, and printed materials, space permitting: Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- Space permitting, include the OTS logo on all grant-funded print materials, graphics and paid or earned social media campaign grant objective; consult the OTS PIO and copy your OTS grant coordinator for specifics, format-appropriate logos, or if space does not permit the use of the OTS logo.
- Email the OTS PIO at pio@ots.ca.gov and copy your OTS grant coordinator at least 21 days in advance, or when first confirmed, a short description of any significant grant-related traffic safety event or program, particularly events that are highly publicized beforehand with anticipated media coverage so OTS has sufficient notice to arrange for attendance and/or participation in the event. If unable to attend, email the OTS PIO and coordinator brief highlights and/or results, including any media coverage (broadcast, digital, print) of event within 7 days following significant grant-related event or program. Media and program highlights are to be reflected in QPRs.
- Any news releases, work plans, scripts, storyboards, artwork, graphics, videos or any educational
  or informational materials that received OTS PIO approval in a prior grant year needs to be
  resubmitted for approval in the current grant year.
- For additional guidance, refer to the <u>OTS Grants Materials Approval Process Guidelines</u> and <u>OTS Grants Media Approval Process FAQs</u> on the OTS website.
- Contact the OTS PIO or your OTS grant coordinator for consultation when changes from any of the above requirements might be warranted.

#### C. Phase 3 – Data Collection & Reporting (Throughout Grant Year)

- 1. Prepare and submit grant claim invoices (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)
- 2. Prepare and submit Quarterly Performance Reports (QPR) (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)
  - Collect and report quarterly, appropriate data that supports the progress of goals and objectives.
  - Provide a brief list of activity conducted, procurement of grant-funded items, and significant
    media activities. Include status of grant-funded personnel, status of contracts, challenges, or
    special accomplishments.
  - Provide a brief summary of quarterly accomplishments and explanations for objectives not completed or plans for upcoming activities.

The preceding statutory and regulatory cites hereinafter are referred to as the "Acts" and "Regulations," respectively.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Award Specification No. 2024-01 Improvements to Rove Engineering for Western Avenue from Main Street to Highway 86 for an amount of \$650,566.85 and authorize a 15% contingency in an amount of \$97,585.03 for a total amount of \$748,151.88 and authorize the City Manager to execute all documentation concerning this project.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

On June 15, 2025, the City of Brawley received authorization to proceed with the Sustainable Transportation Planning Local (STPL) Grant from the California Department of Transportation in the amount of \$778,361.50. The grant provides a reimbursement rate of 81.66%, totaling \$635,623.20, with a required City match of 18.34%, or \$142,751.50.

This grant was awarded to fund improvements along Western Avenue from Main Street to Highway 86. The scope of work includes micro-milling the through lanes and shoulder areas, placement of a hot mix asphalt leveling course on the through lanes, and application of asphalt rubber hot mix. Additional improvements include double adjustment of water valves with new concrete collars, crack filling, Type II slurry seal, striping, pavement markings, and markers.

An Alternate Bid was included to allow the use of the Asphalt Rubber Aggregate Membrane (ARAM) System, which utilizes recycled rubber tires with asphalt rubber binder. This system provides an expected service life of 15–20 years, offering enhanced durability, reduced noise, and long-term maintenance savings, if funding permitted.

Western Avenue is a major collector and one of the City's main thoroughfares. It also serves as a detour route for Highway 86 and 1st Street closures during major construction activities and City-sponsored events.

The Engineering Department advertised the project on September 12, 2025.

On October 14, 2025, the City received and publicly opened two bids, as follows:

Base Bid Alternate Bid

Rove Engineering, Inc.

El Centro, CA \$490,100.85

LC Paving & Sealing, Inc. Lakeside, CA

\$814,011.25



The Engineering Department recommends awarding the contract including the Alternate Bid utilizing the ARAM membrane system, as the total bid amount aligns with the available grant funding.

Award of this contract will allow the City to begin construction by mid to late November 2025.

Approval of this contract will enable the City to proceed with critical street improvements that will extend pavement life, improve roadway safety, and enhance neighborhood livability.

The local bidding preference factor is not applicable to this project, as it is federally funded.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Project 2025-16 (Western Avenue – Main Street to Hwy 86) was included in the FY25/26 Capital Improvement Plan. However, the adopted budget only accounted for \$599,000 in STPL funds and \$77,040 in Measure D funds, for a total project budget of \$676,040. To fully fund the completion of the project, a budget adjustment is required to allocate the remaining necessary funding as follows:

The Brawley Police Department partners annually with WomanHaven, A Center for Family Solutions, to provide coordinated services to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, dating violence, and stalking. WomenHaven is an organization that provides a wide variety of assistance to victims of crime in Imperial County. These services include but are not limited to: 24-hour crisis intervention, assistance with restraining orders, peer support, support for clients regarding the criminal justice system, development and presentation of domestic violence information and education, and providing temporary emergency shelter.

The Operational Agreement formalizes collaboration between the Brawley Police Department and WomanHaven to ensure effective referral processes, joint training opportunities, and consistent victim support. It will serve as guidelines outlining the responsibilities of the Brawley Police Department and WomenHaven as we collaborate to provide the maximum available assistance for crime victims residing in the City of Brawley. This agreement aligns with the Police Department's mission to enhance public safety and community well-being through partnerships that promote victim assistance, reduce recidivism, and improve access to justice.

- 6) Continue to be an active participant in interpersonal violence education, court accompaniment and provide temporary emergency shelter.
- 7) To share information regarding victims of interpersonal violence when appropriate and if authorization has been obtained from the victim.
- 8) Immediate on-call service is available 24 hours a day from WomanHaven.

#### **Brawley Police Department:**

- 1) Direct referral to WomanHaven of appropriate clientele and information, support, and services to staff and victims.
- 2) To engage in cross training and meetings with WomanHaven staff as needed.

Both parties agree that they will provide services in accordance with the generally accepted principles governing care of victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, human trafficking, dating violence and stalking as stated in the WomanHaven project application.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve letter of support for the City of Calexico's efforts to secure equitable Proposition 4 funding for projects addressing water quality, public health, and environmental restoration in the New River watershed.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

In November 2024, California voters approved Proposition 4, a statewide bond measure that includes a \$50 million set-aside specifically for cross-border rivers and coastal waters impacted by pollution from Mexico. The bond language and legislative history identify both the New River in Imperial County and the Tijuana River in San Diego County as eligible watersheds.

The City of Calexico has taken a leadership role in advocating for a fair share of these funds to address the long-standing environmental and public health crisis caused by pollution flowing through the New River from Mexicali into Imperial County. These impacts are well-documented and disproportionately affect border communities, including Calexico and downstream cities such as Brawley.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is no direct fiscal impact associated with this action. Future funding opportunities may arise from successful advocacy efforts.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

The City Council may choose not to issue a letter of support at this time, which may limit the City's role in regional advocacy efforts related to Proposition 4 funding.

On behalf of the City of Brawley, we write to express our full support for the City of Calexico's advocacy to secure fair and equitable Proposition 4 funding for urgently needed projects in the New River watershed. For generations, Calexico residents have stood on the frontline of a binational water-quality crisis, living with the public-health, environmental, and economic impacts of pollution that flows from Mexicali through the New River and into Imperial County communities. Your leadership in pressing for durable solutions honors families who have waited far too long and strengthens our collective case that border communities deserve investment commensurate with the harms they have endured.

Proposition 4, approved by voters in November 2024, includes a dedicated \$50 million set-aside for California-Mexico cross-border rivers and coastal waters—funding clearly intended for both eligible watersheds: projects consistent with the New River Water Quality, Public Health, and River Parkway Development Program in Imperial County and projects in the Tijuana River watershed. We are willing to echo and reinforce your requests through aligned correspondence to the State Water Resources Control Board, the Governor's Office, the Legislature, and federal and binational partners as appropriate. We also support the development of a unified, priority project list that aims to reduce pathogen and contaminant loads, modernize conveyance and treatment systems, protect neighborhoods along the river corridor, and improve the quality of inflows to the Salton Sea. Additionally, we are open to coordinating with Imperial County and the Colorado River Basin Regional Water Quality Control Board to promote a consistent regional message. As opportunities arise, Brawley may also participate in joint statements, delegation meetings, or data-sharing efforts to help strengthen Calexico's applications.

Our communities share the same air, the same watershed, and the same future. Proposition 4 is an opportunity to finally deliver the scale of investment that border families deserve: equitably, transparently, and in accordance with the law's clear intent to serve both cross-border watersheds. Transportation Commission's Caltrans Planning Grant Application to Identify

**Transit-Oriented Development Opportunities within Imperial County.** 

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

City staff recommends that the City Council approve issuing the letter of support to continue interagency cooperation in achieving regional priorities and exploring and promoting transit-oriented development opportunities.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

On October 24, City of Brawley Development Services Staff received a request from the Imperial County Transportation Commission (ICTC) to issue a letter of support for their application for a Caltrans grant.

Per the original email communication, ICTC is pursuing the Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program "to develop a comprehensive planning document that strategically evaluates Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) opportunities near transit centers and key transit bus stops in the communities of El Centro, Calexico, Brawley, Imperial, Seeley, Holtville, and Calipatria".

According to the ICTC, "the goals of this effort are to further the development of housing and economic opportunities within these communities, increase transit ridership, and reduce auto trips within the corridors." The City of Brawley will be able to contribute to the TOD planning document. As such, the ICTC is requesting letters of support from these cities to help intergovernmental cooperation and advance toward local planning goals. They have provided a template that the City's Development Services staff has edited. The deadline to submit the letters is November 13, 2025.

Per the Circulation policies stipulated in IE Goals 1, 3, 5, and 6 of the City's General Plan, the efforts outlined in the ICTC's project description align with the broader policy of pursuing alternative transportation methods and increased public transit ridership.

Examples of such City policies within the General Plan's Circulation Element include but are not limited to the following:

- IE Policy 5.1.1: Support the efforts of the appropriate transportation agencies to provide additional local and express bus service to Brawley.

- IE Policy 6.1.2 Collaborate with local transit agencies to develop programs and educate employers about employee rideshare and transit; establish mass transit mechanisms for the reduction of work related and non-work related vehicle trips; and promote mass transit ridership through careful planning of routes, headways, origins and destinations, and types of vehicles.
- IE Policy 6.3.6 Work with local transit providers to incorporate best design practices for transit as part of new development projects.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

No fiscal impact has been identified for this potential action.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

No alternatives are recommended. Interjurisdictional collaboration to advance transit-oriented development opportunities is a key policy objective in the City's General Plan circulation goals.

The City of Brawley supports the application of the Imperial County Transportation Commission to the FY 2026-27 California Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program to provide funding to develop a comprehensive strategic transit-oriented development (TOD) plan to integrate housing, land use and public transportation around the city's existing transit center and key transportation corridors. We understand that the project would develop a site-specific TOD overlay unique to the city to create a community vision and strategic plan to put in place a policy foundation for future zoning and neighborhood development.

The City supports the project's purpose to pursue alternative transportation opportunities by increasing the attractiveness of public transit and walkable streets to reduce energy consumption and vehicle emissions and increase mobility and accessibility for all, including low mobility groups. We concur that the plan should consider and incorporate strategies and complete streets elements to improve active transportation safety and transit service, and to further consider the inclusion of affordable housing to support higher levels of transit ridership, as lower-income residents may choose transit over the cost of vehicle ownership.

We look forward to hearing that the Imperial County Comprehensive Strategic TOD Plan has been awarded funding through the FY 2026-27 California Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program, and to continuing close coordination with your team to ensure the plan reflects the needs and priorities of the Brawley community.

Subject: 2024/25 General Fund Year-End Budget Report

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Receive and file the 2024/25 General Fund Year-End Budget Report, approve the amended budget carryovers from fiscal year 2024/25 to fiscal year 2025/26, and allocations to reserves.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The City's overall budget is comprised of multiple funds, most of which are restricted for special purposes such as road improvements, housing programs, grants, or enterprise operations such as water, wastewater, or the airport. The year-end budget report focuses only on the General Fund, which supports a variety of city services, programs, and operational expenses.

The report is intended to provide a summary of revenues and expenses for the fiscal year (FY) 2024/25 (from 7/1/2024 through 6/30/2025) and highlight any relevant variances from the final budget, one-time anomalies, and deviations from prior fiscal years. It also provides an update on final carryovers from FY 2024/25 to 2025/26 and reserve balances for the period ended June 30, 2025.

The City is in the process of completing its annual audit and preparing comprehensive financial statements. The General Fund is also included in the annual financial statements; however, this report allows the city to evaluate how the General Fund performed independent of all other funding sources of the City.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Amended expenditure budget carryovers from FY 2024/25 to 2025/26 total \$1,005,558 and are funded with budgetary savings. Revenues not received in FY 2024/25 totaling \$712,146 are anticipated to be received in 2025/26 and also recommended as budget adjustments. A full detailed listing of carryovers is found in Exhibit B of the Budget Report and if approved would be incorporated into the current 2025/26 budget

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

City Council may choose to not approve or amend recommended carryovers and reserve allocations.

#### 2024/245GENERAL FUND YEAR-END BUDGET REPORT

The FY 2024/25 Budget continued to reflect the impacts of rising utility costs, higher inflation, and several position vacancies, along with the addition of new administrative positions and the implementation of employee incentive programs to support staff retention. Despite these challenges, the City's overall financial performance remained strong, demonstrating sound fiscal management and stable revenue trends. Exhibit A provides a one-page summary of total revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year.

#### **REVENUES**

#### **TAX REVENUES**

**Property Taxes** – Secured and unsecured property tax revenues exceeded budget projections by \$ 107,334 primarily due to increases in assessed property values and new construction activity. These factors collectively reflect the continued strength of the local property tax base and stable economic activity within the City.

**Sales taxes** - Sales tax collections exceeded budget projections by \$194,398, primarily due to the sustained increase in fuel prices and higher allocations from the county and state pools. Continued steady local in-person shopping and dining activity, along with the City's strong agricultural and farming operations, also contributed to the overall increase in collections.

**Sales TUT (Measure J)** -The City's additional 1% approved by the voters in the November 2024 general elections went into effect on April 1<sup>st</sup> of 2025. Collections from April 1<sup>st</sup> to June 2025 totaled \$ 1,033,880.

**RPTTF-** (Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund) residual revenues exceeded budget projections by \$430,353.31, reflecting the continued impact of the California Court of Appeal, Third Appellate District decision in *City of Chula Vista v. Sandoval, et al.* As a result of this ruling, ongoing RPTTF distributions to cities and local agencies within Imperial County have increased, while the County's share has been proportionally reduced, with no impact on property taxpayers. The current budget reflects this ongoing redistribution.

**Non-Tax Revenue Negative Variances** were a result of pending revenues not received during FY 2024/25 but anticipated to be received in FY 2025/26. A summary of these revenues is provided below:

If these revenues would have been received as budgeted; revenues would have ended at \$712,146 over budget. The City is expecting to collect these deferred revenues in FY 2025/26, therefore, budget adjustments to these revenues is recommended in FY 2025/26 to avoid large budget to actual variances.

#### **EXPENSES**

Overall, 83% of departments were within budget. The chart below provides a summary of expenses and highlights savings, or overages explained in the narrative following the chart.

#### **EXPENSE OVERAGES**

**Personnel Department –** Overages in the Human Resources Department are related to several facility and office improvements made to reorganize the department and accommodate an increase from two to three staff members (including the addition of an Administrative Clerk). The overages include costs for new workstations and office recarpeting.

**Planning Department –** The overage is directly related to professional services. The Planning Department had been vacant for two years, during which the City outsourced planning functions to a local consultant. The consultant's services were extended until the positions of Development Services Director and Planning Technician were filled, trained, and fully transitioned into office.

**Police Department –** The Police Department reported several overages within its budget. Under Salaries and Benefits, the overages were primarily due to higher personnel costs associated with internal promotions, special assignments, increased health insurance premiums, and sworn personnel overtime. Additionally, the department experienced operational overages related to the purchase of officer equipment, including Getac units, Assaulter System Belt Carriers, and computer replacements. Overages were also noted under Technical Services and Software Subscriptions, resulting from the payment of two years of the ProPhoenix software license and the renewal of the Department's Body-Worn Camera contract.

**Fire Department –** The Fire Department reported overages primarily related to staff incentive pay and overtime, resulting from staff unavailability and special assignments. Additional overages occurred in the Vehicle Repair and Maintenance budget due to major repairs on the Fire Ladder Truck and a motor rebuild on one of the units.

#### **EXPENSE SAVINGS**

Expense savings were primarily the result of some partial vacancies and delayed expenditures, including professional studies and larger facility and equipment improvements. Most of these savings are recommended for carryover to FY 2025/26, as summarized below and detailed in Exhibit B.

Larger departmental savings are discussed below:

**City Clerk –** Net savings totaled \$85,596. These savings are primarily due to budgeted election and records consultant services that were not required during the 2024 General Election. No carryover of savings is recommended for FY 2025/26.

**City Manager-** Net savings total \$94,307. These savings are primarily attributed to the City Manager position vacancy. The position was partially funded through the Police Department, as the Chief of Police served as Interim City Manager during the fiscal year.

**Information Technology** – Overall savings of \$112,165 were achieved due to unused hardware and software contingency funds, which will no longer be required for FY 2025/26

**Non-Departmental** – This department realized savings of \$701,069. A carryover of \$234,508 to FY 2025/26 is recommended to fund the Citywide ADA Transition Facilities Study, the Citywide User Fee Study, and a staffing contingency.

**Engineering** – Savings of \$330,602 were primarily due to vacancies within the Engineering Department and unused professional services budgeted to provide operational flexibility and temporarily expand the department capacity. No carryovers are recommended for FY 2025/26, as all positions have been filled and consulting services have been appropriately budgeted for the current fiscal year.

**Parks** – Savings totaling \$108,328 were realized from a capital improvement project for park equipment replacement that did not commence during the fiscal year. A total of \$100,000 will be carried over to FY 2025/26, as the project remains included in the FY 2025/26 Capital Improvement Program.

**Library** – Savings of \$ 672,239 are associated to Library Building improvements and equipment that will be acquired with the Library Building Forward State grant that was awarded on October of 2023. A total of \$ 611,050 is requested as a carryover to FY 2025/26.

#### **CARRYOVERS**

Carryovers from FY 2024/25 to FY 2024526 were estimated in early June 2025. Invoices for each FY continue to be paid through August of each year. This is known as the accrual period. After all invoices are paid, Finance re-evaluates estimated carryovers to determine final carryovers based on actual expenses and current operational needs. A summary of final recommended carryovers is presented as Exhibit B and includes all City Funds with the largest amounts derived from ongoing multi-year capital projects.

#### **RESERVES**

Adequate reserves ensure the City is able to effectively respond to economic uncertainties and fluctuations without drastically reducing services from one year to the next. The chart below depicts reserve balances by category as of June 30, 2025. These reserve balances reflect the financial health of the City at fiscal year-end. The increase in reserves during FY 2024/25 reflects the prudent allocation of resources for carryovers, future known expenses, and the recognition of budget savings.

A **Capital Replacement Reserve** was established in FY 2021/22 with an allocation of \$500,000. Staff recommends adding \$100,000 to this reserve from unanticipated savings for future capital replacements. This reserve can be used for matching grant funds, to supplement restricted funds used for capital improvements, or to purchase large equipment.

The **Public Safety Personnel Reserve** was established in FY 2021/22 with an allocation of \$100,000. It is recommended to allocate \$100,000 of unanticipated savings for future expenses associated with grant funded positions whereby the City must retain public safety personnel for an additional term after grant funds are expensed.

As a result of unanticipated savings and the positive fiscal impact of Measure J during FY 2024/25, the City's 15% target reserve reached \$11,007,393, exceeding the target by \$7,212,709. Staff recommends conducting an in-depth analysis to determine how this surplus should be managed to ensure that the City sets aside adequate contingency reserves while maintaining ongoing operational flexibility.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the City Council review and approve the revised City of Brawley Dress Code Policy as presented.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The City of Brawley maintains a Dress Code Policy to ensure that employees present a professional image that reflects positively on the City and its organizational culture. The policy applies to all City employees who are not required to wear a uniform and provides clear standards for appropriate workplace attire.

The revised policy clarifies expectations for business casual dress, introduces specific standards for jeans and City logo wear, and outlines prohibited attire. It also incorporates guidance on casual Fridays and themed attire days (such as Cattle Call festivities) to maintain a balance between professionalism and employee engagement.

Additionally, the policy defines the process for approving departmental exceptions, emphasizes safety and appearance standards, and outlines procedures for addressing non-compliance, including potential disciplinary action.

The updates were developed by the Human Resources Department to promote consistency across all departments and ensure that dress standards reflect the City's professional image and values. As part of the policy development process, the City conferred with representatives of the labor unions via email to provide an opportunity for input and ensure alignment with existing Memoranda of Understanding.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is no fiscal impact associated with adoption of the revised Dress Code Policy.

### City of Brawley Personnel Policy

**Subject** City of Brawley Dress Code Policy

Policy Number 153-51

This policy outlines how we expect employees to dress at work. Employees should keep in mind that their appearance matters when representing the City of Brawley to visitors and residents. An employee's appearance can create either a positive or negative impression that reflects on the City and its professional culture.

If the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) addresses the topic, the MOU supersedes this policy.

#### Scope

The City of Brawley Dress Code Policy applies to all City employees not required to wear a uniform.

#### **Elements of Proper Dress**

The City of Brawley's official dress code is **business casual.** Acceptable business casual attire includes:

- Khaki pants, slacks, or trousers
- Modest-length skirts and dresses
- Collared shirts (e.g., polo shirts, button-down shirts)
- Blouses, knit tops, sweaters, and cardigans
- Blazers or casual suit jackets

#### Additional guidelines:

- Employees must be clean and well-groomed. Grooming styles dictated by religion or ethnicity are fully respected.
- Clothing must be work-appropriate. Attire typically worn for workouts or outdoor activities is not permitted for employees whose work setting is in the office.
- Clothing must project professionalism, such as collared shirts, dress pants or skirts, and closed-toe shoes. Clothes that are overly revealing or inappropriate are not allowed.
- Clothing must be clean and in good condition. Discernible rips, tears, or holes are not acceptable.
- Employees must avoid attire with offensive or inappropriate designs, stamps, or images. This includes hats, buttons, or pins with such designs.
- Appearance and safety are of paramount importance.
- City of Brawley logo wear, including t-shirts, is considered appropriate attire if clean and professional in appearance.

Employees may wear denim jeans as part of their regular work attire, provided they meet the following standards:

- Jeans must be clean, neat, and free of holes, fraying, excessive fading, or wrinkles.
- Ripped, torn, distressed, baggy, or overly tight jeans are not permitted.

Jeans must fit appropriately and be paired with professional tops and footwear to maintain a
polished appearance.

#### **Prohibited Attire**

The following clothing items are not permitted in the workplace:

- T-shirts with inappropriate graphics or language.

  Note: T-shirts that are part of a uniform or for a specific city sponsored purpose (e.g., Cattle Call promotions) are allowed.
- Sweatshirts and sweatpants.
- Open-toe shoes (unless they are dress shoes and do not pose a safety concern).
- Casual footwear such as crocs, house shoes (slippers) or flip-flops.
- Swimsuits, tube tops, or halter tops (except for lifeguards wearing job-appropriate swimwear).
- Spandex-type pants, leggings or any excessively tight, sheer or low-cut clothing.
- Short, tight, or revealing skirts or dresses that do not reflect a professional standard.

#### **Casual Fridays and Themed Attire**

The City of Brawley may designate "Casual Fridays" or other themed attire days (e.g., Western wear for Cattle Call festivities). Even on these days, attire must remain professional, respectful, and appropriate for the workplace.

#### **Exceptions**

Department manager/director, with the approval of the City Manager, may authorize job-related or situational exceptions to this policy.

#### **Non-Compliance and Disciplinary Action**

Supervisors are responsible for ensuring compliance with this policy and may address any attire that does not meet these guidelines.

Employees who do not follow the dress code or exceptions approved from their department manager/director, may face disciplinary action, up to and including termination.

If a supervisor determines that an employee's attire is inappropriate, the employee will be sent home to change into appropriate attire and will not be paid for this time while not at work.

**WHEREAS**, the City of Brawley (the "City") is committed to maintaining a professional, respectful, and service-oriented work environment in which employees present a positive image to the public and support the City's mission of providing effective services to residents and visitors; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has determined that a clear Dress Code Policy is necessary to set consistent standards of appearance for non-uniformed employees, thereby promoting the City's professional culture and reinforcing public trust; and

**WHEREAS**, the Human Resources Department has developed a revised Dress Code Policy which outlines appropriate business casual attire, grooming and appearance guidelines, provisions for jeans and logo wear, identifies prohibited attire, and defines procedures for non-compliance and exceptions; and

**WHEREAS,** the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) applicable to a represented employee group may supersede portions of this policy if the MOU addresses the topic of employee attire; and

**WHEREAS** the City Council has reviewed the proposed Dress Code Policy, finds it to be consistent with the City's objectives and service standards, and desires to adopt the policy in order to ensure uniform application across all applicable departments.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the City Council of the City of Brawley as follows:

**Adoption.** The City Council hereby adopts the Dress Code Policy of the City of Brawley (the "Policy"), in substantially the form presented to the City Council and on file with the City Clerk, which shall apply to all City employees who are not required to wear an official uniform.

**Effective Date.** This Policy shall become effective on [insert effective date] and shall supersede any prior City dress code guidelines for non-uniformed employees, except as may be superseded by any applicable MOU.

**Implementation.** The City Manager and Human Resources Director are authorized and directed to implement the Policy, distribute it to all affected employees, provide appropriate training or guidance as needed, and ensure supervisory compliance consistent with the provisions of the Policy.

**Modifications/Exceptions.** Department managers and directors, with the approval of the City Manager, may authorize job-related or situational exceptions to the Policy as provided therein. Any modifications to the Policy shall be submitted to the City Council for review and approval if substantive.

**Enforcement.** Supervisors are responsible for ensuring compliance with the Policy. Employees who fail to comply may be sub

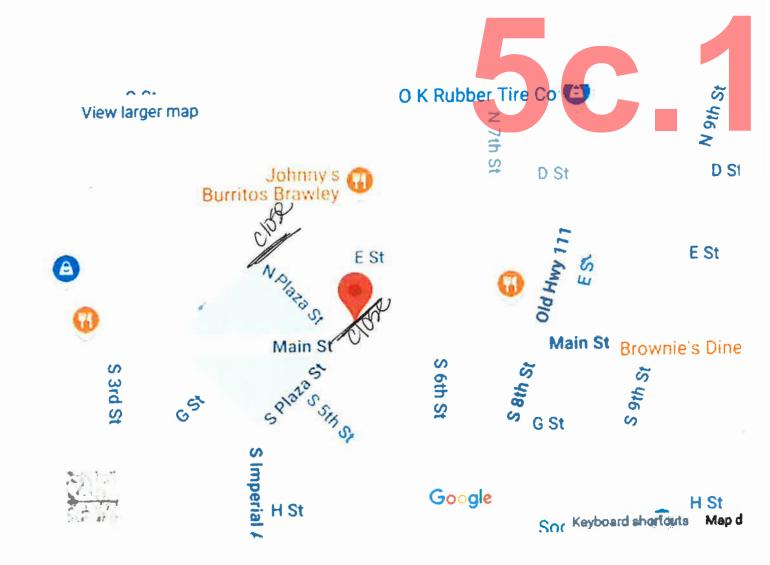

Subject: Approve a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Brawley

Elementary School District (BESD) and the City of Brawley to Implement a Youth Soccer Program (MLS GO) through the Brawley Police Department

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council approve and adopt the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City of Brawley and the Brawley Elementary School District (BESD) to allow the Brawley Police Department (BPD) to implement a youth soccer program under the MLS GO model.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The Brawley Elementary School District (BESD) is interested in establishing a collaborative partnership with the Brawley Police Department (BPD) to facilitate the implementation of the MLS GO soccer program. This initiative seeks to enrich youth extracurricular activities and promote community involvement through youth soccer.

The MLS GO soccer program is designed to provide a structured and constructive environment for youth engagement in soccer, thereby promoting physical activity, teamwork, and social skills. Through collaboration with BESD, the BPD will have the opportunity to extend its reach to a broader audience and ensure the program's success.

The BPD, in partnership with BESD, is committed to fostering a love for soccer and promoting healthy, active lifestyles among our students by overseeing the comprehensive implementation of the MLS GO soccer program. This exciting program will be offered at multiple school sites across the district, ensuring wide accessibility and participation for all eligible students.

We believe that engaging students in such programs enhances their physical skills and builds teamwork, discipline, and leadership qualities. The BPD will take the lead in providing high-quality coaching and mentorship, inspiring students to achieve their personal best both on and off the field.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Implementing the MLS GO soccer program will require funding for equipment, uniforms, and related expenses. BESD shall contribute \$450,000.00 annually to operate this program. This financial support will cover the operational costs for up to 400 students.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF BRAWLEY AND BRAWLEY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT AGREEMENT FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE MLS GO YOUTH SOCCER PROGRAM

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made and entered into by and between the Brawley Elementary School District, a public school district organized and existing under the laws of the State of California (hereinafter referred to as "BESD"), and the City of Brawley, California (hereinafter referred to as "CITY"). BESD and CITY are referred to collectively herein as "the Parties." The City's department that shall be primarily responsible for implementing this agreement is the Brawley Police Department ("BPD").

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, BESD desires to offer high-quality enrichment and physical activity opportunities for its students through the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP); and

WHEREAS, BPD has the capacity and commitment to coordinate, staff, and operate a recreational youth soccer program under the MLS GO model that promotes physical wellness, teamwork, and community engagement; and

WHEREAS, both Parties seek to formalize a collaborative agreement to implement the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program as part of BESD's ELOP offerings for students in grades TK–6 during the 2025-2026 school year, including intersession days;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

#### I. PARTIES TO THE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into by and between the following Parties:

BESD – A public school district located in Brawley, California, is committed to providing high-quality education and supporting the development of students in grades TK through 8. BESD seeks to enhance student learning and engagement through afterschool and extended learning opportunities in alignment with California's ELOP.

The City, a general law city organized and existing in the State of California, to be implemented by BPD, municipal law enforcement agency serving the City, that is committed to public safety, youth outreach, and community engagement. BPD operates 54533597.1/005009.00088

various youth development initiatives and community partnership programs, including recreational and mentorship-based services aimed at fostering positive youth-police relations.

Together, these Parties mutually agree to collaborate for the implementation and operation of the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program during the 2025-2026 school year as part of BESD's ELOP strategy to provide access to high-quality enrichment activities that support student learning, physical health, and character development.

#### II. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a collaborative partnership between the BESD and the City, working with the City's BPD to implement and operate the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program as a component of BESD's ELOP.

#### This program aims to:

- Enhance student development by offering a structured, age-appropriate recreational soccer experience that supports physical fitness, social skills, teamwork, discipline, and leadership.
- Expand access to enrichment activities for BESD students, particularly English Learners, foster youth, and low-income students, by providing no-cost participation in seasonal leagues and clinics that align with the goals of BESD's ELOP Plan Guide.
- Strengthen community relationships through positive interaction between youth and law enforcement personnel, fostering trust, mentorship, and shared community responsibility.
- Provide year-round programming through:
  - 1. Two structured soccer seasons annually (Spring and Fall); and
  - 2. Two seasonal soccer clinics/camps (Summer and Winter), designed to engage students during school breaks.
- Utilize the resources and personnel of the BPD/City and approved volunteers to coordinate program operations, provide trained coordinators, and ensure proper oversight and safety of all activities.
- Ensure full compliance with ELOP requirements, including student access, adultto-student ratios, equitable participation, and alignment with the instructional and developmental goals outlined by the California Department of Education.

By working together, BESD and the City and BPD commit to delive<mark>ring a sustainable and impactful recreational program that contributes to the holistic development of students and builds stronger ties between schools, families, and public safety personnel.</mark>

#### III. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The MLS GO Youth Soccer Program is a structured, year-round recreational sports initiative developed to engage BESD students in active, enriching, and skill-building soccer experiences. As an ELOP-aligned activity, the program supports physical health, teamwork, and youth development while strengthening school-community partnerships. The MLS GO program shall be aligned to BESD's 2025-2026 instructional calendar, including intersession days.

#### A. Program Format and Schedule

The program operates year-round and consists of:

#### Two Seasons Per Year:

Spring Season: March through June (10 weeks)
Fall Season: September through January (10 weeks)

Each season includes two sessions per week (practice or games)

#### Two Clinics/Camps Per Year:

Winter Clinic/Camp
Summer Clinic/Camp
Each clinic/camp includes two sessions per week, per school.

#### **B.** Season Definition

A season refers to a structured 10-week cycle of league play consisting of:

- Player evaluation and team assignments
- Two sessions per week, including practices and/or games for each participant
- U10 (Under 10 yrs.) teams: Practice sessions of 1 hour
- 10+ (Over 10 yrs.) teams: Practice sessions of 2 hours
- Weekly game days with officiated matches
- Up to 24 games per week for 8 weeks per season, officiated by trained referees
- Coach-led instruction aligned with MLS GO curriculum
- Team jerseys and equipment provided to participants

End-of-season celebration with player recognition and awards
 Each season is focused on building fundamental soccer skills, reinforcing teamwork,
 and providing a safe and fun environment for learning and physical activity.

#### C. Clinic/Camp Definition

A clinic or camp is a short-term, intensive soccer experience held during intersession days to promote continuous engagement. Each clinic/camp includes:

- Two sessions per week, per school typically held on non-school days or after school
- U10 (Under 10 yrs.) teams: Practice sessions of 1 hour
- 10+ (Over 10 yrs.) teams: Practice sessions of 2 hours
- Open skill stations for passing, dribbling, shooting, defense, and fitness
- Team-building activities and friendly scrimmages
- Character-building discussions centered on sportsmanship, perseverance, and teamwork
- Guest speakers or community mentor visits
- Participation certificates and small rewards

Clinics/camps are open to all skill levels and are designed to:

- Reinforce foundational soccer skills
- · Keep students engaged during academic breaks
- Promote healthy habits and social connection

#### D. Student Participation

BESD will sponsor up to 400 students per season or camp/clinic.

Enrollment will prioritize equity, inclusion, and access for all students, especially those qualifying under ELOP criteria (unduplicated pupil counts).

#### **E. Program Goals**

The MLS GO Youth Soccer Program aims to:

- Support academic and behavioral success through physical activity and engagement
- Build confidence, communication, and leadership in students
- Create opportunities for structured mentorship between students and police personnel
- Reinforce school-community trust and unity

#### IV. CITY RESPONSIBILITIES

The City shall task BPD to serve as the lead implementing agency for the operation, coordination, and day-to-day management of the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program. BPD agrees to provide staffing, logistical support, training, and oversight to ensure a safe, effective, and enriching experience for all participants.

#### A. Program Coordination and Oversight

BPD will:

Serve as the primary program operator, responsible for organizing and managing all aspects of the MLS GO soccer seasons and clinics/camps.

Oversee program scheduling, supervision of BESD students enrolled in the program, and implementation in alignment with BESD's ELOP Plan Guide and the MLS GO standards.

Manage registration processes, team creation, communications with families, and coordination of fields and facilities. BPD will make information available in both English and Spanish and in a form that is easily understandable for all parents/guardians.

Maintain a safe environment, including the presence of trained staff at all sessions, adherence to safety protocols, and emergency response procedures.

Communicate behavior expectations to participants in advance of registration and enforce behavior expectations for participants.

Prohibit discriminatory conduct in the MLS GO program and undertake any actions necessary to prevent, address, and resolve instances of unlawful discrimination.

Request from parents/guardians of students participating in the MLS GO program pupil health information as needed for student safety considerations in the program. Program requirements include that the City must request from parents/guardians pupil health information, such as whether a pupil has allergies or asthma, before pupil enrollment in the MLS GO program pursuant to Education Code section 8483.4. In addition, the City may provide parents an opportunity to execute a written consent to release pupil health information from BESD to BPD.

#### **B. Personnel Assignments**

All City personnel, including but not limited to BPD personnel (employees, coaches, referees, volunteers) assigned to the MLS GO Program shall be subject to the health screening (Educ. Code § 49406) and fingerprint clearance requirements (Educ. Code § 45125.1) under the Education Code and BESD policy for school personnel and volunteers. BPD/the City shall submit to BESD the certification enclosed as **Exhibit A**.

BPD will assign the following staff to support program operations:

One (1) Full-Time Police Youth Program Coordinator I, responsible for:

- Program management
- Coordination with BESD
- Scheduling and logistics
- Events and promotion
- On-site supervision
- Coaching as needed or required
- Oversight of coaches, referees, and approved volunteers

Two (2) Part-Time Police Youth Program Coordinator positions. Responsibilities include:

- On-site supervision
- Support with practices, games, and clinics
- Assisting with student check-in, equipment setup, and logistics
- Scheduling and logistics
- Coaching as needed or required
- Oversight of coaches, referees, and approved volunteers

#### C. Coach Recruitment and Training

BPD will recruit, coordinate, and train additional coaches for the program, as follows:

#### **Coach Recruitment Sources**

Coaches may be recruited from the local community or from a pool of City employees.

All coaches must meet health screening requirements, pass background checks, and be cleared to work with minors prior to participation as described below.

# **Training Requirements**

5d.1

Prior to service, each coach will complete required trainings on:

- Mandated reporting of child abuse or neglect
- Concussion protocols
- Heat illness prevention
- Cardiac arrest emergency response
- MLS GO curriculum and expectations
- Youth supervision, positive coaching, and safety procedures

#### Coaching Schedule:

Coaches will lead two sessions per week for 10 weeks per season Session duration:

• U10 teams: 1 hour per session

• 10+ teams: 2 hours per session

BPD shall manage coach assignments, maintain timesheets, and ensure coach performance and conduct meet the goals and standards of the program.

### D. Referee Management

BPD shall recruit and manage referees to officiate games during the 8-week game period of each season:

Referees shall be scheduled as needed, based on the weekly game schedule (up to 24 games per week)

Referees will receive 2 hours of training in match rules, youth engagement, and gameday procedures per year.

BPD will ensure referees are properly vetted, trained, and equipped

All coaches, referees, and volunteers shall be subject to the health screening and fingerprint clearance requirements under the Education Code and BESD policy for school personnel and volunteers.

# E. Equipment and Game Setup

#### BPD will:

• Purchase, store in BPD facilities, and distribute all necessary equipment, uniforms, goals, and supplies required to conduct practices, games, and clinics

- Coordinate game-day setup, including field markings, safety equipment, and water stations
- Ensure all materials align with MLS GO guidelines and are maintained in safe, functional condition

#### F. Reporting and Communication

#### BPD will:

- Maintain attendance, participation, and activity records for all sessions
- Submit records of student attendance to BESD on each day of the program
- Maintain adult-student ratios in alignment with the ELO-P regulations
- Submit quarterly updates to BESD on program status, participation numbers, and expenditures
- Be primarily responsible for supervising and addressing student participant behavior in the MLS GO program and maintaining standards for appropriate student conduct. In serious cases, BPD may collaborate with BESD to address any concerns related to student safety, student discipline, or program quality, while recognizing the MLS GO program is managed and operated by BPD for the benefit of BESD students.
- Designate a point of contact for BESD staff and families
- Be responsible for personnel matters involving its staff, including coaches, volunteers, and/or referees working in the MLS GO program.

#### V. BESD RESPONSIBILITIES

The BESD shall serve as the funding partner, providing the financial resources and educational alignment necessary to implement the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program as a qualified ELOP. BESD agrees to support equitable access to enrichment and physical development for all eligible students.

Should BESD students with special needs desire to participate in the MLS GO program, BESD will provide accommodations consistent with students' Individualized Education Programs and/or Section 504 Plans for those students while engaged in MLS GO activities under this MOU. BESD personnel may support BPD's MLS GO program at the district's discretion. BESD personnel will not be assigned to provide medical services to pupils participating in the MLS GO program unless doing so is required for their participation under an IEP or 504 Plan. Any concerns regarding such BESD staff assigned to BPD's MLS GO program shall be directed to the BESD Superintendent.

Should games, matches, scrimmages, or tournaments occurring in the MLS GO program under this MOU require BESD students to travel to a location other than their regular school of attendance, and if those activities occur on a BESD school day, including intersession days, BESD will provide transportation for students via the BESD transportation department. BPD shall provide BESD with 30 calendar days' notice of any request for such transportation.

If any parent, participant, or community member directs a complaint regarding a BPD employee, volunteer, coach, or referee to BESD, BESD will forward or direct those complaints to BPD's program coordinator responsible for overseeing such personnel matters.

#### A. Program Funding

For the 2025-2026 school year, BESD will pay to the City a total amount of \$450,000, payable within 30 calendar days of the BESD governing board's ratification of this MOU. This payment shall sponsor up to 400 BESD students per camp/clinic and is intended to reimburse the City/BPD for staffing costs, referees, uniforms, and equipment expenses.

#### **B. Student Recruitment and Enrollment**

BESD will:

Promote program opportunities to students and families through district schools and communication channels;

Coordinate student enrollment lists with BPD to confirm participation eligibility (enrollment as a BESD student) and monitor attendance for ELOP reporting purposes; and

Ensure outreach prioritizes unduplicated pupils in accordance with ELOP guidelines (English learners, foster youth, and low-income students).

#### C. Program Compliance and Support

BESD will:

Provide guidance as needed to BPD to ensure that all funded activities align with the requirements of California's ELOP, including allowable uses, access, and instructional alignment;

Collaborate with BPD as needed to review and approve all planned activities, schedules, and expenditures;

Participate in review meetings with BPD as needed to evaluate program performance, identify challenges, and coordinate improvements

#### D. Data and Reporting

BESD will:

Provide guidance to BPD regarding needed documentation of all financial expenditures in accordance with state audit standards.

Submit necessary ELOP reporting and compliance data to the California Department of Education.

Receive participation, attendance, and program updates from BPD/City on a daily basis for inclusion in district records and accountability reports. BESD shall provide instruction to BPD representatives regarding the method of submitting daily student attendance data.

#### E. Facilities Use

BESD will make all reasonable efforts to provide access to district-owned soccer fields or other suitable outdoor spaces for practices, games, and camps associated with the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program. Field access will be coordinated in good faith and will be subject to:

Availability based on school schedules, maintenance needs, and other district programming.

Prior communication and scheduling between BESD and BPD.

Compliance with BESD's facility use policies, including any required permits, supervision standards, or site-specific procedures.

Weather, specifically, safety and conditions consistent with heat illness prevention expectations for outdoor physical activity.

BESD will commit to supporting the program's operational needs to the greatest extent possible.

#### VI. DATA SECURITY

In the event BESD student or parent information is affected in a breach or cyber security incident in BPD or the City's systems or files, the City will take actions necessary to try to secure or mitigate the breach, and the City will provide written notice to the affected parties whose data was compromised as soon as possible and in accordance with California and federal law.

# VII. DURATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall become effective upon the date of the last signature by an authorized representative of either party, including ratification by the BESD governing board, and shall remain in effect until July 2, 2026.

#### A. Automatic Renewal

Unless otherwise terminated as described below, this Agreement shall automatically renew annually on its anniversary date for successive one-year terms (after the last day of summer academy), subject to:

- Availability of funding through BESD's ELOP
- Successful program implementation, including BESD student participation levels demonstrating student interest, and compliance with all terms, conditions, and performance expectations
- Written confirmation of continued participation and mutual agreement by both parties, no less than thirty (30) calendar days prior to renewal

#### **B.** Termination

Either party may terminate this Agreement prior to its expiration by providing written notice at least sixty (60) calendar days in advance. Reasons for early termination may include, but are not limited to:

- Loss of funding; however, any sudden or unforeseen cessation of ELOP funding shall not be subject to sixty (60) days' notice of termination
- Non-compliance with program requirements
- Inability to perform agreed-upon responsibilities
- Mutual agreement to conclude or restructure the partnership

In the event of termination, both Parties agree to cooperate in good faith to resolve outstanding matters and ensure a smooth transition or closure of program activities with minimal disruption to students and families.

#### VIII. INSURANCE AND LIABILITY

To ensure the safety of all participants and mitigate potential risks associated with program operations, both parties agree to the following provisions related to insurance and liability:

#### A. Insurance Coverage

The City

Shall maintain general liability insurance, workers' compensation, and automobile liability coverage, as applicable, in accordance with the City's municipal policies and at levels required of groups using BESD facilities under the Civic Center Act and BESD Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 1330.

Shall ensure that all program personnel, including coordinators, coaches, and referees employed by or contracted through the City, are covered under applicable City insurance policies while acting within the scope of their assigned program duties.

BESD

Shall maintain general liability insurance and other applicable coverage consistent with its obligations as a public educational agency.

Shall ensure that its employees and representatives participating in any aspect of the MLS GO program are adequately insured under the district's policies.

#### **B.** Certificate of Insurance

Prior to execution of this MOU, each party shall provide the other with a Certificate of Insurance evidencing the required coverage. Each party will name the other party as an additional insured where feasible and appropriate.

#### C. Indemnification

The City agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless BESD, its officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all claims, liabilities, damages, or expenses resulting from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of the City, its officers, agents,

employees, or program contractors arising out of or related to the execution of this Agreement.

BESD agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City of Brawley, its officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all claims, liabilities, damages, or expenses resulting from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of BESD, its officers, agents, employees, or representatives arising out of or related to the execution of this Agreement.

#### D. Student and Volunteer Safety

Both parties will ensure that all individuals who have direct contact with students, including coaches, referees, volunteers, and program personnel, are subject to fingerprint-based background checks and health screenings, consistent with the California Education Code and public safety protocols.

All safety procedures, emergency contact protocols, and mandatory reporting requirements will be followed in accordance with applicable law and agency policy.

The City is required to notify BESD by the next working day following, and to submit a written report within seven days of, the occurrence of any health- or safety-related issues, including, but not limited to: issues involving criminal background clearances for the City's employees working in the MLS GO program, including its coaches, referees, and volunteers; building safety; and any event specified in subdivision (c) pursuant to Education Code section 8483.4(b).

#### IX. PROGRAM EVALUATION AND REPORTING

To ensure accountability, transparency, and continuous improvement of the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program, both BESD and the BPD agree to participate in ongoing program evaluation and data sharing as permitted by law.

#### A. Post-Program Reports

BPD shall submit a report after each season and clinic/camp summarizing:

- Student enrollment and attendance data
- Activities held (e.g., practices, games, workshops)
- Number of games conducted and referees assigned
- Notable outcomes, challenges, or areas for improvement

### **B. Review Meetings**

BESD and BPD will meet bi-annually, or more frequently as needed or requested by either party, to:

- Review reports and program data
- · Address operational issues or funding updates
- Discuss recommendations for program improvements
- Plan upcoming seasons or clinics

#### **C. Annual Program Summary**

At the end of each program year (each year ending the last day of summer academy), BPD will provide BESD with a comprehensive program summary, which shall include:

- Total number of students served throughout the year
- Participant demographics, including unduplicated pupil counts
- Total number of practices, games, and events held
- Evaluation of program outcomes and alignment with ELOP goals
- Recommendations for the following year

# D. Compliance with ELOP and California Department of Education Requirements

BESD shall retain primary responsibility for ensuring that all aspects of the MLS GO Program funded through ELOP meet state and local requirements.

BPD will support BESD by providing any requested documentation or data needed for:

- Annual audits
- California Department of Education ELOP reporting
- Local program evaluation or board reporting

# E. Feedback and Continuous Improvement

Both parties will collaborate to gather feedback from students, families, and staff to improve program quality.

BESD and the City agree to:

- Use findings to inform decision-making
- Implement feasible improvements based on community and participant input

#### X. AMENDMENTS

This MOU constitutes the sole and entire agreement and understanding between the Parties with respect to the entire subject matter hereof, and any and all prior discussions, negotiations, commitments, promises, and understandings related hereto are merged herein. This Agreement is the final and complete expression of the understandings of the Parties. This Agreement may be amended, modified, or supplemented at any time upon mutual written consent of both Parties, subject to BESD and the City's governing board ratification. To maintain flexibility and responsiveness to evolving needs, the following terms shall apply:

#### A. Written Amendments Required

Any proposed changes to this Agreement, including program structure, funding amounts, roles, or timelines, must be documented in writing and signed by an authorized representative of both BESD and the City.

#### **B. Review and Approval Process**

Either party may initiate a request for amendment by submitting a written proposal outlining the requested changes and justification.

Upon receipt, the other party shall review the proposal in good faith and respond within a reasonable timeframe, not to exceed 30 calendar days.

#### C. Non-Waiver of Terms

Failure by either party to enforce any provision of this Agreement at any time shall not constitute a waiver of that provision or any other part of the Agreement.

#### D. Agreement Reaffirmation

Any approved amendments shall be incorporated into the Agreement by formal addendum and shall become effective on the date specified in the amendment document.

All other provisions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged and in full force unless otherwise specified in the amendment.

#### XI. CONSTRUCTION

The language and all parts of this MOU shall be construed according to its fair meaning, in compliance with the law. The Parties acknowledge that each party has reviewed this MOU and agree that any rules of construction to the effect that ambiguities are to be

resolved against the drafting party shall not apply in any interpretation of this MOU or any amendments hereto, rather the MOU shall be interpreted as if each party contributed equally in the drafting and construction of all of the language and each of the terms herein.

#### XII. ATTORNEY'S FEES, VENUE

If a suit or a claim is brought by either party to this Agreement to enforce any of its terms or to otherwise litigate a dispute concerning this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for bearing their own fees and expenses irrespective of whether any party is deemed the prevailing party.

In the event of litigation, this MOU and related matters shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Venue shall be with the appropriate state or federal court located in Imperial County, California.

#### XIII. SIGNATURES

By signing below, the authorized representatives of the BESD and the City agree to the terms and conditions outlined in this Agreement for the implementation of the MLS GO Youth Soccer Program as part of BESD's ELOP.

This Agreement is entered into voluntarily and in good faith by both parties and shall be effective as of the date of BESD governing board ratification.

Subject: Budget Adjustment to FY 25-26 and Position Allocations for One Full-Time

Firefighter and One Full-Time Limited-Term Firefighter - Brawley Fire

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

1) Approve a budget adjustment in the amount of \$109,072 for the hiring of one (1) new Full-Time Firefighter position and one (1) new Limited-Term Firefighter position for the remainder of the fiscal year; and

2) Authorize the addition of two (2) new position allocations within the Brawley Fire Department as follows:

One (1) Full-Time Firefighter; and

One (1) Full-Time Limited-Term Firefighter through June 30, 2025.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The Brawley Fire Department is currently budgeted for 22 operational positions, consisting of 16 Firefighters and 6 Fire Captains. At present, five (5) Firefighters are unable to work their regularly scheduled shifts due to confidential personnel-related reasons.

Normal staffing consists of two shifts with seven (7) personnel per day and one shift with eight (8) personnel per day. The Department's minimum staffing level is six (6) per day, which cannot be reduced without compromising basic and expected service levels.

Due to current vacancies and temporary absences, the Department has been required to rely heavily on holdovers, where personnel remain on duty for an additional 24 hours—resulting in a total work period of 72 hours. Previously, the Department experienced 48-hour holdovers for a total of 96 consecutive work hours. In addition, requested leave has frequently been canceled or denied due to limited staffing and a lack of available coverage.

As of October 2025, approximately 44% of the Fire Department's annual overtime budget has been expended to maintain minimum staffing levels. The Department responds to approximately 3,000 calls for service per year, with an incident overlap rate of 38%, meaning that multiple calls occur simultaneously more than one-third of the time. Continuous holdovers under this operational tempo negatively impact morale and, with reduced rest periods, can lead to fatigue-related safety and decision-making concerns.

In FY 2024/25, the City adopted a phased plan to add one (1) Firefighter position per year over three fiscal years to align staffing levels with the Service Area Plan (SAP) recommendations. One (1) Firefighter was added in FY 2024/25; however, the FY 2025/26 Firefighter addition was deferred.

To address the current staffing strain and maintain safe operational readiness, staff recommends the immediate addition of one full-time Firefighter and one full-time limited-term Firefighter. The limited-term position would remain in effect through June 30, 2025, at which time Fire Department staffing and workload will be reevaluated.

Firefighter testing and interviews have been completed, and an eligibility list is currently active to facilitate timely appointments to the requested positions.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The FY25/26 Operating Budget includes a Contingency allocation for staffing. An internal budget adjustment is recommended to transfer \$109,072 from Account 101-191.000-710.900 to the Fire Department Salaries and Benefits budget to provide funding for the hiring of two full-time firefighters.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

- 1) Approve the requested budget adjustment and position allocations as recommended.
- 2) Approve the addition of only one of the two proposed positions.
- 3) Deny the request and provide alternate direction to staff.

**CLASS TITLE:** Firefighter

**BASIC FUNCTION:** Under general supervision, responds to fire alarms, traffic accidents, rescues and other emergency calls to protect life, environment and property. Participates in training and drill activities; participates in the maintenance of the fire department apparatus, equipment and facilities; performs various staff support assignments; and performs related work as assigned.

#### **REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES:**

#### **ESSENTIAL DUTIES:**

Responds to emergency calls in the effort of protecting life and property with firefighting and rescue tactics, assists in fire prevention, and the routine duties associated with the care and maintenance of fire department property and equipment. The emergency calls comes from a variety of alarms, such as structural and environmental fires, traffic accidents, natural gas leaks, medical emergencies and hazardous material spills.

Provides first responder medical emergency response at the Basic and EMT support level, including initial patient and situation assessment, cardiopulmonary resuscitation and trauma emergency medical care; prepares patients for transport and assists paramedics in advanced life support emergency medical care.

Fights fires under departmental procedures and as directed by a fire company officer; connects and lays hose lines, sets ladders and operates fire streams; uses hand and power tools to ventilate and enter burning structures for the purpose of extinguishing fires and to perform search and rescue operations; raises, lowers, and climbs ladders to enter structures; performs salvage, clean up, and overhaul operations during and after fires to remove hazards and protect property.

Participates in drills, demonstrations and courses in firefighting techniques, equipment and apparatus operation, medical aid, heavy rescue, hazardous materials, fire prevention, equipment maintenance and a wide variety of other subjects related to the fire service.

#### OTHER DUTIES:

Perform related duties as assigned.

#### **KNOWLEDGE AND ABILITIES:**

#### KNOWLEDGE OF:

- Principles, practices, and procedures used in modern firefighting and in the protection of life, environment and property.
- Operational characteristics of fire suppression apparatus and equipment.
- Purposes, proper use, and maintenance requirements of a variety of vehicles, equipment, tools, and apparatus used in firefighting, rescue, and medical assistance operations.
- Methods and techniques of handling hazardous materials.
- Geography and street layout of the City and surrounding area.
- Safety practices and precautions pertaining to the work; proper lifting, carrying and climbing

techniques.

#### ABILITY TO:

Understand and apply mechanical and physical principles related to fire suppression;

- Ability to follow directions and orders of superiors quickly, and to function effectively in emergency situations;
- Read, understand, and apply the rules, regulations, and operational procedures of the fire department;
- Read and understand technical manuals and materials concerning fire fighting; D
- Demonstrate physical endurance to perform hazardous tasks under emergency conditions;
- Work indoors and outdoors in a variety of environmental conditions including hot, cold, or damp weather with exposure to excessive heat, smoke, hazardous materials, explosions, odors, dust, and in tightly enclosed spaces with poor ventilation;
- Use and operate a variety of firefighting related equipment and machinery;
- Understand and follow oral and written instructions;
- Communicate clearly, concisely and effectively, both orally and in writing; ability to render emergency medical care; ability to establish, foster and maintain positive, harmonious working relationships with other employees, officials and the public.

**EDUCATION; Licenses; Certificates; Special Requirements:** A high school graduate or GED equivalent. Candidate must be enrolled in fire science courses or has completed a fire academy at an accredited institute. EMT and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation certifications are required. Must obtain a Firefighter I within first year of employment. Must be able to obtain a valid California driver's class "C" with all the proper firefighter's endorsements within the first year of employment.

Applicants are required to meet the City's physical standards and pass a physical examination prior to employment.

#### **WORKING CONDITIONS:**

ENVIRONMENT: Work in an emergency firefighting environment; work in medical emergency situations, including vehicle accidents, swift water rescues, medical and rescue emergencies; work in intense lifethreatening conditions,; exposure to fire, smoke, bodily fluids, swift water, heights and noise. React to emergencies, natural or man-made disaster.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS: Firefighting is physically demanding. Candidates must be in excellent health and have no condition that would restrict their ability to safely do fire suppression and rescue work. Essential and marginal functions require maintaining physical condition necessary for running, walking, crawling, climbing, stooping and heavy lifting while wearing heavy protective equipment; work in inclement weather conditions.

OTHER DEMANDS: Employees are regularly required to use written and oral communication skills; read and interpret data, information and documents; analyze and solve problems; observe and interpret situations; learn and apply new information or skills; and interact with City staff, other organizations and the public.

Some of these requirements may be accommodated for otherwise qualified individuals requiring and requesting such accommodations.

#### **Disaster Service Workers:**

Under California Government Code Sections 3100 - 3109, public employees are designated as disaster service workers. The term "public employees" includes all persons employed by the state or any county, city, state agency, or public district. Disaster service workers are required to participate in such disaster service activities as may be assigned to them by their employer or by law. The employees working for the City of Brawley take this responsibility seriously. Disaster plans are continuously being evaluated, drills are scheduled, and employees engage in training where they practice executing emergency support services.

The above job description is intended to represent only the key areas of responsibilities; specific position assignments will vary depending on the business needs of the department.
