

Subject: **Potential Action to Approve Final Parcel Map (PM) 24-02 - Rancho Porter Subdivision**

RECOMMENDATION:

City staff recommends that the City Council approve Final Parcel Map (PM) 24-02 for recordation, as the map is consistent with the City of Brawley General Plan, Subdivision Ordinance, Zoning Ordinance, and the Rancho Porter Specific Plan, and complies with the conditions of approval for Tentative Parcel Map (TPM) 24-02.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

City of Brawley Development Services staff has received Final Parcel Map (PM) 24-02 for the subdivision of a 38.71-acre site located between State Route (SR) 111 and future Seabolt Drive (APN 047-100-007). The site is generally located south of the existing Pilot Travel Center at 1850 Main Street.

The site is currently zoned P-D (Planned Development), which allows flexible development plans for special study areas identified in the General Plan Land Use Element that may benefit from unique or specialized land use and design controls not otherwise achievable under conventional zoning regulations. The purposes of the P-D district include permitting compatible mixtures of land uses, allowing for planned commercial and industrial areas, and encouraging a variety of housing styles and densities. The subject site is located within the Rancho Porter Specific Plan area.

Pursuant to the Rancho Porter Specific Plan, the subdivided parcels to be developed (excluding the remainder Parcel "A") are designated C-RE (Commercial – Regional). C-RE parcels within the Specific Plan area are located adjacent to SR-111 and Main Street (former SR-78) and are comparable to the City's C-2 (Medium Commercial) zoning district. The C-RE designation allows regional-serving commercial uses such as restaurants, hotels, and large-format retail establishments. Permitted uses in the C-RE district are consistent with those allowed in the C-2 district pursuant to Article V of the Zoning Ordinance.

Existing uses on the site consist of agricultural operations and a retention basin; other areas are vacant. No historic uses other than agriculture have been identified.

PM 24-02 subdivides the northern portion of the 38.71-acre parcel into four lots:

- Parcel 1 – 2.35 acres
- Parcel 2 – 2.35 acres
- Parcel 3 – 3.19 acres

- Parcel 4 – 2.48 acres

The remaining 27.62 acres will remain as Parcel “A.” Parcels 1, 2, and 3 are currently vacant, while Parcel 4 is partially developed with a retention basin. Parcel “A” is presently used for agriculture and is expected to remain in agricultural use until further development of the Rancho Porter area occurs.

At this time, Parcels 1, 2, and 4 have not been identified for specific development. Parcel 3 has been conceptually identified as the potential site of a Hampton Inn and Home2 Suites hotel development adjacent to SR-111. Preliminary plans indicate a three-story, 40-foot-tall hotel containing 136 guest rooms, 143 standard parking stalls, 12 semitruck parking stalls, an approximately 10,183-square-foot on-site retention basin, and a swimming pool. Any such development proposal would be subject to separate review and approval processes.

Approval of Final Parcel Map PM 24-02 does not approve any specific development; future projects on the subdivided parcels will be subject to separate discretionary and ministerial review, as applicable.

In accordance with the Subdivision Map Act and Section 23A.7 of the Brawley Municipal Code, the applicant submitted Tentative Parcel Map (TPM) 24-02 to the Planning Division in August and September 2024. The Planning Commission approved TPM 24-02 with conditions on April 21, 2025. Conditions of approval include required improvements to Main Street, Seabolt Drive, and Porter Court, as well as construction of retention basins consistent with the Rancho Porter Specific Plan.

Pursuant to the Subdivision Map Act and Section 23A.12 of the Municipal Code, the applicant subsequently submitted Final Parcel Map PM 24-02 for review by the Acting City Surveyor (NV5). NV5 has reviewed and approved the Final Parcel Map for recordation, subject to City Council approval, and executed the map with a wet signature dated February 23, 2026. In accordance with Section 23A.2 of the Municipal Code, the City Council shall approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove final maps and retains authority to determine the kinds and extent of required off-site improvements. Pursuant to Gover

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no direct fiscal impact associated with approval of the Final Parcel Map. Required subdivision improvements will be constructed by the developer in accordance with approved plans and applicable conditions.

ALTERNATIVES:

The City Council may approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove Final Parcel Map PM 24-02. However, as the Final Parcel Map is consistent with the approved Tentative Parcel Map and applicable regulations, staff recommends approval.





 25. Lighting shall be installed per City Standards and if applicable, in accordance with the Imperial County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP), if applicable.
 26. Utilities shall be undergrounded, where feasible, Per Sec. 23A.16 of the Zoning Ordinance. The infeasibility of utility undergrounding will be determined per Zoning Ordinance Sec. 23A.16.
 27. Fences, walls, and hedges shall be installed per Sec. 27.179 of the Zoning Ordinance and Sec. 27.84.
 28. Trash enclosures shall be installed per Sec. 27.182 of the Zoning Ordinance.
 29. Signage shall be installed per Article XIV of the Zoning Ordinance.
 30. Developer/Applicant/Property owner shall abide by the requirements of the Porter Ranch Specific Plan Environmental Impact Report and accompanying Mitigation, Monitoring, and Reporting Program, as applicable.
 31. The Developer's engineer shall prepare a hydraulic study during the project design and complete the required improvements to the Brawley Water Distribution System to provide the required combined peak domestic and fire flow demand to the project site. The City of Brawley Fire Chief shall establish the required fire flow and residual pressure required for this project.
 32. Hydrology, drainage, and grading details to City standards shall be provided to the Public Works Director and City Engineer. Each parcel shall have 100 percent on-site retention and shall conform to the development standards enumerated in the Rancho Porter Specific Plan. The retention basin shall be designed to meet the requirements of a 100-year storm or in accordance with City Standards or State requirements, whichever is more stringent shall prevail. Retention basins shall be owned, maintained, operated by the Developer/Applicant/Property Owner.
 33. Should the project stormwater retention basin, as detailed in the project hydrology and drainage report or any other relevant technical report, require a stormwater pump station, it shall be installed at the retention basin to transport stormwater from the retention basin

to the City's existing stormwater system. The stormwater pump station shall empty the retention basin stormwater volume within 72 hours after the conclusion of a stormwater event. The stormwater pump station shall be owned, operated, and maintained by the Developer/Applicant/Property Owner.

34. Prior to the issuance of a Building Permit, the Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall submit a sewer plan consistent with the approved Site Plan and Conditions of Approval. The sewer plan shall be based on an approved Sanitary Sewer Study. If the existing sewer line within the vicinity of the project site is deemed insufficient, the Developer/Applicant/Property Owner is responsible for the construction of the larger diameter pipeline.
35. Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall provide water and sewer analysis, prepared by a CA registered engineer, to confirm overall capacity in the receiving system. Should improvements be required, the applicant shall prepare a public improvement plan for the necessary upgrades/repairs, to the satisfaction of the Public Works Director and City Engineer. Should future improvements be necessary, the applicant shall be responsible for the payment of any and all Fair Share costs toward water and sewer improvements prior to the issuance of grading permits.
36. Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall submit water technical documentation as required by the Regional Quality Control Board. Technical documentation shall be approved by the Public Works Director and City Engineer prior to the issuance of a Grading Permit.
37. All sewer lines must maintain the minimum slope requirements and must be buried as specified and approved by the City Engineer and Director of Public Works.
38. If improvements or installation of a sanitary sewer pump station are required for these parcels (PM 24-02), the cost of the installation or improvement to the sanitary sewer pump station will be owned and be the responsibility of the Applicant, Developer, or Property Owner or its successors.
39. If improvements to the sewer force main are required for these parcels (PM 24-02), the cost of improvements will be the responsibility of the Applicant, Developer, or Property Owner or its successors.
40. Manholes will be improved, added, and adjusted to City Standards as required by the City Engineer and Director of Public Works.
41. Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall install fire hydrants per California Fire Code and approval by the City Fire Department prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy.
42. The Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall pay the expenses of school district fees per the requirements of the Brawley Unified School District prior to the issuance of any Building Permit.
43. The Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall pay a Fair Share cost of a fire apparatus with the capabilities to serve buildings of more than two stories or equaling or exceeding 35 – feet, prior to the issuance of a Building Permit. The City of Brawley fire apparatus fleet cannot serve buildings more than two stories or equaling and exceeding 35-feet and will impact the ability to issue Building Permits for such structures.
44. The Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall pay all applicable impact and capacity fees prior to the issuance of a Building Permit and prior to connecting to City services. The City of Brawley collects impact fees to offset the cost of fire, police, parks, water, wastewater, and administrative services.
45. The Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall pay any and all amounts as determined by the City of Brawley to defray all costs for the review of maps, drawings, reports, field

investigation, or other activities related to compliance of this project with City Ordinances and/or any other laws, regulations, or requirements that apply to the improvement plans and Final Parcel Map. No Final Parcel Map shall be recorded until such costs have been paid to the City.

46. The provisions of these Conditions of Approval are to run with the land/project and shall bind the current and future owner(s) successor(s) in interest, assignee(s), and/or transferor(s) of said project.
47. The applicant shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Brawley, or its agents, officers and employees from any claim, action or proceedings against the City or its agents, officers, or employees to attack, set aside, void or annul, an approval by the Planning Commission or City Council concerning the subdivision.
48. Pursuant Government Code Section 66463.5, the Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall have twenty-four (24) months from the approval of TPM 24-02 to file a Final Map otherwise the TPM shall expire and no longer be valid.
49. Developer/Applicant/Property Owner shall obtain a tax certificate from the County Tax Collector.

-END-

(a) Requirements for Final Maps.

1. If more than three sheets are used, an index showing the entire subdivision with lots numbered consecutively shall be provided.
2. Map contents shall be per planning department requirements.

(b) Preparation of Final Maps. After approval of a tentative map by the planning commission, the subdivider may cause a final map to be prepared in accordance with a completed final survey of the subdivision, and in compliance with all provisions of this ordinance and the Subdivision Map Act.

1. Size and Material. The final map shall be of a size and material noted in the Subdivision Map Act.
2. Title Sheets. Title sheets shall be drawn and contain information as required in the Subdivision Map Act.
3. Certificates. Forms for certificates required by the Subdivision Map Act and this chapter may be secured from the planning department.
4. Surveying Data for Lots. Surveying data shall be per Subdivision Map Act requirements.
5. Surveying Data for Final Maps. The final map shall indicate the centerlines of all streets. The central angle or delta angle, tangent, radius and length of curve for all horizontal curves shall be noted. Each horizontal curve shall be numbered on the plan sheet. The numbered curve, with the corresponding horizontal curve components shall be listed in a curve data chart. The bearing of the radius lines of a horizontal curve shall be noted if those lines are used for closure calculations in determining property corners or verifying the area of the land parcel. The widths of streets, new dedications, existing dedications, easements, rights-of-way, and their centerlines shall be shown. Natural and man-made features such as drainage channels, railroads, bridges, irrigation canals, and rivers shall be shown. Surveys completed in connection with the preparation of subdivision maps shall be made in accordance with standard practices and principles for land surveying. A traverse of the boundaries of the subdivision and all lots and blocks shall close within a limit of error of one foot in ten thousand feet of perimeter.
6. Record of Easements. The final map shall show the width of all easements to which the lots are subject. If the easement cannot be definitely located of record in the county recorder's office, a statement as to the nature of the easement shall appear on the title sheet. Easements for water lines, storm drains, sewer lines, and other utilities shall be denoted by broken lines. The width of the easement and the lengths and bearings of the lines thereof shall be clearly shown on the final map and sufficient survey data indicated to properly locate

the easement. If the easement is already of record in the recorder's office, proper reference to the record shall be given. Easements being dedicated shall be so indicated in the certificate of dedication.

7. Existing Monuments. The final map shall clearly show what existing monuments or other evidence was found on the ground to determine the boundaries of the subdivision. The corners of adjoining subdivisions or portions thereof shall be indicated on the final map and ties shown.
8. New Monuments. In accomplishing the survey for a subdivision, the engineer or surveyor shall set sufficient permanent monuments so that the survey or any part thereof may be readily retraced. Such monuments shall generally be placed at all angle points and curve points on the exterior boundary lines of the subdivision, also at all points of intersection of street center lines and at all angle points and curve points on street center lines and at such other points as may be necessary to serve the above requirements. Monuments set at lot corners will not be considered permanent. Permanent monuments shall be of a design specified by the city engineer. The character, type and positions of all monuments and covers shall be noted on the final map. All permanent boundary monuments shall be placed prior to filing the final map with the planning director for checking. Before checking the map, the planning director and city engineer shall satisfy themselves that all monuments shown thereon actually exist and that their positions are correctly shown.
9. Established Center Lines of Streets and Alleys. Whenever the city engineer has established the center line of a street or alley, the data shall be considered in making the survey and in preparing a final map, and all monuments found shall be indicated and proper references made to field books or maps of public record relating to the monuments. If the points were reset by survey ties, that fact shall be stated on the final map. The final map shall show city boundaries crossing or adjoining the subdivision and such boundary lines shall be clearly designated.
10. Lot Numbers. All lots in a subdivision shall be numbered consecutively, commencing with the number one, with no omissions or duplications; provided, that where the subdivision is a continuation or second phase to an existing subdivision, the lot numbers may commence with the number immediately following the last or highest number of such existing subdivision, and in all other respects shall conform with the preceding requirements. Each lot shall be shown entirely on one sheet. Blocks may be used. They shall be consecutively numbered in the same manner as required for numbering lots.
11. Requirements for Grading Plan and Erosion Control Plan. Pursuant to the requirements of section 66411 of the Subdivision Map Act, each final map filed for checking by the planning department shall be accompanied by a grading plan and erosion control plan designed to prevent sedimentation and damage to off-site property. The grading plan and erosion control plan shall be approved by the city engineer.

(c) Procedure for Approval of Final Maps. After the planning commission has approved or conditionally approved the tentative map, the subdivider may submit to the planning director the original final map and improvement plans and a duplicate tracing thereof drafted on good quality tracing cloth or polyester base film, accompanied by a completed application and the documentation required therein.

1. Traverse sheets and field survey notes showing the closure, within the allowable limits of error, of the exterior boundaries of the subdivision of each irregularly shaped block and lot within the subdivision;
2. Plans and specifications of the proposed off-site improvements, including a grading and erosion control plan, water study, sanitary sewer study and drainage study. Such improvement plans shall be accompanied by a cost estimate and the necessary bonds, cash deposit, letter of credit, or other improvement security authorized by the state Subdivision Map Act;
3. A copy of the deed restrictions and protective covenants to be recorded;
4. The following information shall be shown on the final map:
 - a. The total area of the subdivision,
 - b. The total area of the streets and alleys,
 - c. The total area in lots, and
 - d. The total area in parks, school sites and other land offered for dedication or reserved for future public or quasi-public use.

After receipt of the final map, and after the appropriate filing fees have been paid by the subdivider, the planning director shall examine the final map to ensure it meets all the conditions, if any, established by the planning commission during the tentative map approval process. The planning director shall examine the final map for completeness and ensure all required certificates and dedications are signed and acknowledged. After the final map has been examined by the planning director, it shall be transmitted to the city engineer, along with the improvement plans and grading plan, for his review and approval.

The city engineer shall review the final map and transmit his comments to the planning director within thirty days of receiving the final map. If the final map and/or the improvement plans are found to be incomplete, they shall be returned to the subdivider accompanied by a letter from the city engineer stating what deficiencies need to be corrected before the final map and improvement plans can be considered for approval. The city council may only approve a final map that complies with its tentative map. No changes may be proposed.

(d)

Dedications and Improvements. All streets, alleys, and highways, and other parcels of land shown on the final map and intended for any public use shall be offered for dedication to the city. Dedications offered for future streets and alleys shall be designated on the final map as "dedicated for future street," or other public facility, as the case may be.

The subdivider shall construct off-site improvements, or agree to construct off-site improvements, on all land dedicated for streets, highways, alleys, public ways, and easements, as a condition of approval of the final map. Such improvements shall include grading, asphalt surfacing of streets, alleys and highways, sidewalks, curbs, gutters, culverts, catch basins, bridges, storm drains, water mains, sanitary sewers, street lights, permanent subdivision monuments, and such other structures or improvements as set forth herein, or deemed by the city council to be necessary for the general use of the lot owners in the subdivision. Local neighborhood traffic and drainage needs shall be considered when improvement plans for subdivisions are designated by the subdivider or his engineer. All improvements shall be installed to grades approved by the city engineer. Plans, profiles, and specifications of proposed improvements shall be furnished to the planning director at the same time as the final map is filed. The planning director shall submit all improvement plans to the city engineer for approval. All plans, profiles and specifications for the proposed improvements shall show full details and be designed to city standards or an alternate approved by the city engineer.

If such improvements are not completed satisfactorily before the final map is submitted for approval, the owner or owners of the subdivided property, as a condition of final map approval, shall enter into an agreement with the city council upon mutually agreeable terms to thereafter complete the off-site improvements within one year of final map approval at the subdivider's expense.

As security to assure that such improvements are constructed, the subdivider shall furnish security to the city council as follows:

1. Security for the faithful performance of such agreement in an amount equal to one hundred percent of the total estimated costs of such improvements;
2. Security in an amount not less than one hundred percent of the total estimated costs of such improvements, securing payment to the contractor, subcontractors and to persons furnishing labor, materials, or equipment to them in the performance of the required improvements;
3. Security in a sum equal to ten percent of the total estimated costs of such improvements for the guarantee and warranty of the work for a period of one year following the completion and acceptance of the improvements against any defective work or labor done, or defective materials furnished;
4. Such security shall be of a type authorized by the Subdivision Map Act, as the same now provides or may be hereafter amended, at the option of and subject to the approval of the city council;

5. The security required by this chapter and the Subdivision Map Act shall be released as provided for in the state Subdivision Map Act, as the same now provides or may be hereafter amended.

(e) Minimum Improvements Required. The minimum improvements which the subdivider shall be required to construct or enter into bonded agreement to construct in the subdivision prior to the acceptance and approval of the final map by the city council shall be as follows:

1. Water mains and water connections to each lot;
2. Sewer mains and sewer connections to each lot;
3. Storm drainage facilities to provide for adequate drainage of the subdivision streets, alleys, and highways;
4. Grading and paving of streets, alleys, and highways located within and adjacent to the boundaries of the subdivision;
5. Curbs, gutters, and sidewalks;
6. Street lighting;
7. Permanent subdivision boundary monuments and other permanent monuments required by the city engineer;
8. Fire hydrants at locations recommended by the fire chief.







Subject: **Potential Action to Approve Agreement with GovInvest, Inc. (d.b.a. TrueComp) for Labor Costing Software Subscription**

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the Master Service Agreement and Order Form with GovInvest, Inc., doing business as TrueComp, for a three (3) year subscription to the TrueComp Labor Costing Software in an amount not to exceed \$45,000, and authorize the City Manager to execute all necessary documents.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The City currently utilizes the TrueComp Labor Costing software platform to analyze and model labor-related expenses. The existing subscription term expires on March 28, 2026. The proposed agreement provides for a new three-year subscription term beginning March 29, 2026, and ending March 29, 2029.

TrueComp is an online software platform designed to assist public agencies in calculating and modeling labor-related costs for budgeting and collective bargaining purposes. As outlined in the Statement of Work, the software allows the City to:

- Upload salary schedules and compensation bands
- Model cost drivers such as COLAs, special pays, pension, healthcare, and taxes
- Configure and modify cost assumptions in real time
- Run multiple “what-if” scenarios and compare results side-by-side
- Filter results by employee sub-groups for demographic and analytical reporting

This tool enhances the City’s ability to project long-term labor costs and evaluate the fiscal impact of proposed compensation adjustments. Additionally, it provides the City as a whole with a structured and data-driven approach to run different cost scenarios during labor negotiations.

For reference, under the City’s prior agreement executed in 2022, the Labor Costing Module was licensed at approximately \$5,000 per year, for a three-year total of \$15,000. Since that time, the platform has expanded in scope and functionality, and the vendor has transitioned to a revised pricing model based on enhanced modules and analytical capabilities. The vendor’s initial renewal proposal reflected current market pricing for similarly situated public agencies; however, staff negotiations resulted in materially improved pricing terms for the City.

The Finance Department engaged in direct negotiations with the vendor to secure more favorable pricing for the City. By committing to a three-year term rather than a shorter renewal period, staff negotiated a tiered pricing structure that represents a substantial reduction from the vendor's initial renewal quote and provides long-term predictability.

Approval of this agreement will ensure continuity of service and maintain the City's ability to perform accurate and efficient labor cost modeling to support financial planning and negotiations.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total cost of the three-year subscription is \$45,000, structured as follows:

- Year 1: \$10,000
- Year 2: \$15,000
- Year 3: \$20,000

The tiered pricing structure reflects negotiated annual increases agreed upon as part of the three-year commitment and remains below the vendor's originally quoted annual rate. The average annual cost over the term is \$15,000 per year.

The City will ensure that the required subscription amounts for Years 2 and 3 are incorporated into the respective upcoming fiscal year budgets as part of the annual budget development and adoption process. Funding for this agreement is included in the adopted operating budget for FY25-26. Approval of this agreement does not require additional appropriations at this time but represents a planned, ongoing operational expenditure that will be programmed into future budget cycles.

This investment supports responsible long-term personnel cost forecasting, which represents the City's largest ongoing expenditure category.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Do not approve the agreement. This would result in the discontinuation of the City's labor costing platform and require staff to conduct complex labor analyses manually, increasing the risk of error and significantly impacting staff workload during budget development and labor negotiations.
2. Direct staff to negotiate revised terms with the vendor.

SOFTWARE SERVICE GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

These Software Service General Terms and Conditions are entered into by and between GovInvest, Inc., d.b.a. TrueComp ("Company"), and City of Brawley, CA, the entity executing the applicable Order Form ("Customer"), and governs Customer's use of the Software Service, and if applicable Professional Services. The terms and conditions of this Agreement will be binding on the parties by mutual execution of the applicable Order Form which includes reference to this Agreement and as of the effective date of such Order Form.

1. DEFINITIONS

- a. **"Agreement"** means collectively, this Software Service General Terms and Conditions, any Exhibits, and each Order Form.
- b. **"Authorized User"** means an employee or contractor of Customer that Customer has registered to access and use the Software Service.
- c. **"Confidential Information"** means any business or technical information disclosed by one party to the other party, provided that it is identified as confidential at the time of disclosure or that under the circumstances, a person exercising reasonable business judgment would understand it to be confidential or proprietary.
- d. **"Customer Data"** means the data and information input or uploaded into the Software Service by the Customer or its Authorized Users.
- e. **"Fees"** means the fee Company charges to Customer for the Software Service or Professional Services as detailed in each Order Form or SOW.
- f. **"Order Form"** means the document that is signed by both parties, and that identifies the Software Service that Customer has contracted to use.
- g. **"Professional Services"** means any consulting, development, customization, configuration, training or other professional services that Company agrees to provide or have provided to Customer pursuant to an agreed SOW.
- h. **"Intellectual Property Rights"** means patent rights (including, without limitation, patent applications and disclosures), copyrights, trade secrets, moral rights, know-how, and any other intellectual property rights recognized in any country or jurisdiction.
- i. **"Software Service"** means the Internet based software-as-a-service offering from Company that Customer contracts with Company to access and use pursuant to an Order Form.
- j. **"SOW"** a statement of work document that is signed by both parties and describes Professional Services to be provided by Company to the Customer and the fees to be paid for such services.

2. SERVICES

- a. **Services.** Subject to the terms of this Agreement, Company grants Customer a limited, non-exclusive, non-transferrable right to access and use the Software Service set forth in the Order Form during the Subscription Term solely for Customer's own business purposes. Subject to a fully executed SOW, Company will provide Professional Services.
- b. **Support.** Subject to the terms of this Agreement, Company will provide Customer with reasonable technical support services in accordance with the terms set forth in Exhibit A.

3. RESTRICTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- a. **Restrictions.** Customer will not, directly or indirectly; reverse engineer, decompile, disassemble or otherwise attempt to discover the source code, object code or underlying structure, ideas, know-how or algorithms relevant to the Software Service or any software, documentation or data related to or used to provide the Software Service, and modify, translate, or create derivative works based on the Software Service or any Software Service nor use the Software Service for timesharing or service bureau purposes or otherwise for the benefit of a third party or remove any proprietary notices or labels. Further, Customer shall not export or re-export, either directly or indirectly, the Software Service or any copies thereof in such manner as to violate the export laws and regulations of the United States or any other applicable jurisdiction in effect from time to time (including, without limitation, when such export or re-export requires an export license or other governmental approval without first obtaining such license or approval). Without limiting the foregoing, Customer shall not permit any third parties to access or use the Software Service in violation of any United States export embargo, prohibition, or restriction. Customer shall be responsible for obtaining and

maintaining any equipment and ancillary services needed to connect to, access or otherwise use the Software Service (collectively, "Equipment"). Customer shall also be responsible for maintaining the security of the Equipment, Customer account, passwords (including but not limited to administrative and Authorized User passwords) and files, and for all uses of Customer account or the Equipment with or without Customer's knowledge or consent.

- b. **Suspension and Disablement.** Company may suspend the use of a Software Service, or remove or disable any Authorized User's account, if Company reasonably and in good faith believes that a violation of the Agreement has occurred or as may be reasonably necessary to address any material and imminent security vulnerability that Company discovers or reasonably suspects. Company will use reasonable efforts to notify Customer prior to any such suspension or disablement, unless Company reasonably believes that (i) it is prohibited from doing so under applicable law or legal process; or (ii) it is necessary to delay notice in order to prevent imminent harm to a Software Service or a third party, in which case Company will promptly notify Customer when these restrictions no longer apply.
- c. **Usage Data.** Company may collect, use and disclose quantitative data and information related to the performance of a Software Service, for industry analysis, benchmarking, analytics, research and development, marketing and other business purposes ("Usage Data"). If Company discloses Usage Data, such will be de-identified and aggregated.

4. CONFIDENTIALITY

- a. **Use and Nondisclosure.** A receiving party will not use the disclosing party's Confidential Information except as necessary under this Agreement and will not disclose Confidential Information to any third party except to those of its employees and contractors who have a business need to know such Confidential Information; provided that each such employee and contractor is bound to confidentiality restrictions at least as restrictive as the terms set forth in this Agreement. Each receiving party will protect the disclosing party's Confidential Information from unauthorized use and disclosure using efforts equivalent to the efforts that the receiving party uses with respect to its own confidential information and in no event less than a reasonable standard of care. The obligations and restrictions set forth in Section 3(a) will not apply to any information that: (i) is or becomes generally known to the public through no fault of or breach of this Agreement by the receiving party; (ii) is rightfully known by the receiving party at the time of disclosure; (iii) is independently developed. The provisions of this Section 4(a) will remain in effect during the Term and for a period of five (5) years after the expiration or termination thereof, except with regard to trade secrets of the disclosing party, which will be held in confidence for as long as such information remains a trade secret.

- b. Company owns and retains: (i) the Software Service, and all improvements, enhancements or modifications made by any party; (ii) the Usage Data, and any feedback or suggestions provided by Customer or Authorized Users regarding the Software Service; (iii) any software, applications, inventions or other technology developed by Company in connection with providing the Software Service; (iv) Company's name, logo, and other trademarks; and (v) all Intellectual Property Rights in and to any of the foregoing.

If Customer reports the non-conformance, Company will exercise reasonable efforts to re-perform the Professional Service in conformance with the warranty. If Company is unable to re-perform the Professional Service in conformance with the warranty within 60 days after receiving Customer's written warranty claim, upon receiving a written termination and refund request from Customer, Company will terminate the applicable SOW and

refund any Fees Customer paid for the non-conforming Professional Services. **This Section 8(e) states Customer's exclusive warranties and remedies (and Company's sole liability) in connection with the performance of a Professional Service.**

- f. **Third-Party Items.** Certain commercial third-party software products, hardware products, and services ("**Third-Party Items**") are contained in or used to deliver the Software Service. Customer accepts these Third-Party Supplier Terms by using the Software Service. - g. **Disclaimers.** Except as expressly provided in this Section 8, neither party makes any warranty of any kind, whether express, implied, statutory or otherwise, and to the maximum extent permitted by applicable law each party specifically disclaims all implied warranties, including any implied warranties of merchantability, accuracy, fitness for a particular purpose, title or non-infringement. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Company does not warrant that any Software Service will meet your requirements or operate without interruption or error. Each party disclaims all liability and indemnification obligations for any harm or damages caused by any third-party hosting providers.

9. INDEMNITY

- a. **Indemnification by Company.** Company shall hold Customer harmless from liability to third parties resulting from infringement by the Software Service of any United States patent or any copyright or misappropriation of any trade secret, provided Company is promptly notified of any and all threats, claims and proceedings related thereto and given reasonable assistance and the opportunity to assume sole control over defense and settlement; Company will not be responsible for any settlement it does not approve in writing. The foregoing obligations do not apply with respect to portions or components of the Service (i) not supplied by Company, (ii) made in whole or in part in accordance with Customer specifications, (iii) that are modified after delivery by Company, (iv) combined with other products, processes or materials where the alleged infringement relates to such combination, (v) where Customer continues allegedly infringing activity after being notified thereof or after being informed of modifications that would have avoided the alleged infringement, or (vi) where Customer's use of the Service is not strictly in accordance with this Agreement. RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager, Finance Director, and Deputy Fire Chief to execute for and on behalf of the City of Brawley all necessary applications, certifications, and documents required by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), including Form OES-FPD-130, for the purpose of obtaining financial assistance under the California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) for the 2025 Mid-September Rain Event (CDAA-2025-12).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In mid-September 2025, the City of Brawley experienced a severe rain event that caused widespread and significant infrastructure damage throughout the community. Impacts included damage to public streets, storm drain systems, and other critical public facilities. The City's estimated damages total approximately \$2.9 million.

On October 15, 2025, under the authority of the Proclamation of Local Emergency issued by the County of Imperial, the City requested assistance through the California Disaster Assistance Program administered by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.

On December 29, 2025, the City received formal notification that Gavin Newsom, Governor of the State of California, proclaimed a State of Emergency for the 2025 Mid-September Rain Event pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act. The Governor's proclamation determined that the severity and magnitude of the incident were beyond the capabilities of local government to respond to and recover from without state assistance and approved Imperial County's request for CDAA funding (CDAA-2025-12). The notification letter from Cal OES dated December 29, 2025, is included as Attachment No. 2, along with a copy of the Governor's Proclamation and the CDAA Application Process Briefing materials.

The California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) provides state financial assistance to local governments for costs associated with the repair, restoration, or replacement of public real property and infrastructure damaged as a result of a proclaimed State of Emergency. Based on the Governor's proclamation, the City of Brawley is eligible to apply for reimbursement of eligible disaster-related costs under the CDAA program.

To initiate the reimbursement process, Cal OES requires the City to designate authorized agents who may execute and submit required documents, including Form OES-FPD-130 (Designation of Applicant's Agent Resolution). The resolution must identify the officials authorized to act on behalf of the City in all matters pertaining to state disaster assistance.

Staff recommends that the City Council authorize the following positions to execute and submit all necessary documents related to CDAA-2025-12:

- City Manager
- Finance Director
- Deputy Fire Chief

Authorizing multiple officials ensures continuity in processing time-sensitive documentation and compliance with Cal OES requirements.

Conclusion:

The 2025 Mid-September Rain Event caused significant and widespread public infrastructure damage within the City of Brawley. With the Governor's proclamation of a State of Emergency, the City is eligible to pursue reimbursement under the CDAA program. Adoption of the proposed resolution is a required administrative step to authorize designated City officials to execute and submit necessary documentation to Cal OES and secure available state disaster assistance funding to offset eligible costs.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The City has identified approximately \$2.9 million in estimated damages resulting from the 2025 Mid-September Rain Event. Approval of the resolution enables the City to pursue reimbursement under the CDAA program for eligible costs.

CDAA funding will help offset General Fund and other City fund expenditures related to disaster response and infrastructure repair.

ALTERNATIVES:

The City Council may consider the following alternatives to the recommended action:

- The Council may choose not to adopt the resolution. However, without designation of authorized agents through Form OES-FPD-130, the City would be unable to formally apply for CDAA reimbursement, potentially foregoing significant state financial assistance.
- The Council may modify the resolution to designate different or additional authorized officials. Any changes must comply with Cal OES requirements for authorized agent designation.



As a result of assessments conducted following the event, the determination was made that the impacts from the 2025 Mid-September Rain Event were of such severity and magnitude to be beyond the capabilities of local government to respond to and recover from.

Therefore, it has been determined that an SOE is warranted and Imperial County's request for CDAA funds is approved for the 2025 Mid-September Rain Event (CDAA-2025-12). My staff will contact your authorized agent on record under separate cover to provide the forms necessary to apply for reimbursement utilizing the CDAA Program.

PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS beginning on September 18, 2025, a powerful storm system ("2025 Mid-September Storm") impacted San Bernadino and Imperial Counties; and

WHEREAS the 2025 Mid-September Storm, fueled by tropical storm Mario, produced exceptionally high winds, heavy rainfall, flash flooding, and mudslides; and

WHEREAS the 2025 Mid-September Storm caused damage to roads and other infrastructure, including flooding and mudslides impacting State Routes 38, 62, and 178 in San Bernardino County that resulted in severe erosion, washouts, undermined embankments and other issues; and

WHEREAS the 2025 Mid-September Storm caused significant infrastructure damage in Imperial County and especially within the City of Brawley, including damage to canal systems and electrical to transmission lines and poles that resulted in a widespread loss of power throughout Imperial County; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8558(b), I find that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist due to the 2025 Mid-September Storm in San Bernadino and Imperial Counties; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8558(b), I find that the conditions caused by the 2025 Mid-September Storm, by reason of its magnitude, are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of any single local government and require the combined forces of a mutual aid region or regions to appropriately respond; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8625(c), I find that local authority is inadequate to cope with the magnitude of the extreme peril posed by the 2025 Mid-September Storm; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8571, I find that strict compliance with various statutes and regulations specified in this Proclamation would prevent, hinder, or delay the mitigation of the effects of 2025 Mid-September Storm.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GAVIN NEWSOM, Governor of the State of California, in accordance with the authority vested in me by the State Constitution and statutes, including the California Emergency Services Act, and in particular, Government Code section 8625, **HEREBY PROCLAIM A STATE OF EMERGENCY** to exist in San Bernadino and Imperial Counties due to the 2025 Mid-September Storm.


IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. All agencies of the state government shall utilize and employ state personnel, equipment, and facilities for the performance of any and all activities consistent with the direction of the Office of Emergency Services and the State Emergency Plan. Also, all individuals are to obey the direction of emergency officials with regard to this emergency in order to protect their safety.
2. The Office of Emergency Services shall provide assistance to public entities in Imperial County, if appropriate, under the authority of the California Disaster Assistance Act, Government Code section 8680 et seq., and California Code of Regulations, Title 19, section 2900 et seq.
3. The California Department of Transportation shall formally request immediate assistance through the Federal Highway Administration's Emergency Relief Program, United States Code, Title 23, section 125, in order to obtain federal assistance for local road and highway repairs or reconstruction that are needed due to the 2025 Mid-September Storm.
4. The restrictions set forth in Penal Code section 396, which are automatically triggered upon proclamation of a state of emergency, are suspended, and no such restrictions are imposed, with respect to the 2025 Mid-September Storm in San Bernadino and Imperial Counties.

I FURTHER DIRECT that as soon as hereafter possible, this Proclamation be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this Proclamation.

This Proclamation is not intended to, and does not, create any rights or benefits, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity, against the State of California, its agencies, departments, entities, officers, employees, or any other person.

On December 23, 2025, a Governor's Proclamation was issued to secure funding to help the City of Brawley and Imperial Irrigation District respond to and recover from the Mid-September Storms. This fact sheet contains information regarding the available assistance and California Disaster Assistance Act (CDA) application information.

The Mid-September Storms (CDA 2025-12) makes available CDA funding for eligible costs for City of Brawley and Imperial Irrigation District.







 - Title 19 mitigation measures are restricted to damaged infrastructure impacted by the disaster event and in conjunction with permanent work projects.
 - No state hazard mitigation funding shall be applied to any emergency protective measure.

CDAA Title 19 - Hazard Mitigation

41.4

1. Eligible mitigation measures must be cost effective over the projected life of the facility for a specific facility hazard mitigation project and substantially reduce the risk of repetitive and/or future damage, hardship, loss, or suffering resulting from a disaster or emergency.
2. Applicants with facilities subject to repetitive damage must show cause when hazard mitigation measures are not considered when repairing new disaster damage.
3. Applicants with facilities in high hazard zones... should examine hazard mitigation project possibilities when disaster repairs to these facilities are being considered.

CDAA Title 19 - Hazard Mitigation

4f.4

4. Cost effective measures are those that will not cost more than the anticipated value of the reduction in both direct damages and subsequent indirect negative impacts to the area if future disasters or emergencies occur.
 - i. Mitigation projects costing less than fifteen percent (15%) of the approved project repair, restoration, or replacement costs shall be considered cost effective.
 - ii. Mitigation projects above fifteen percent (15%) of the approved project cost may be considered cost effective if an acceptable benefit-cost analysis (BCA) has been performed.

CDAA Title 19 Mitigation Examples

- Protect against erosion and scour around the discharge of a culvert. Extend the culvert discharge beyond the toe of embankment to mitigate erosion and scour. Use energy-dissipating riprap to mitigate scour.



Important Points

4f.4

1. **Identify and contact the responsible state and federal resource agencies** before work can begin;
2. Only when EHP process is complete with those agencies and **documented**, can project activities or construction begin without putting obligation of funding at risk;
3. **Sub-Applicants and Sub-Recipients are responsible** for all EHP compliance requirements;
4. **All applicable environmental laws must be addressed** in the EHP process **even if** a Statutory or a Categorical CEQA Exemption, or, a Statutory or Categorical NEPA Exclusion (e.g., STATEX or CATEX) is obtained;
5. **A change in a project scope will require the EHP process to restart** to address the modification which may delay project start;
6. **Contact CalOES PA, HMGP, and EHP** to help identify appropriate Federal and State Agency Representatives that need to be consulted with on your projects; and
7. **Keep copies of all correspondence and other documents.**





RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that Council approve the proposed street closure and the sale of alcohol for the César Chávez Celebration on Saturday, March 28, 2026.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Los Amigos de la Comunidad, Inc. will host its annual César Chávez Celebration on Saturday, March 28, 2026. The organizers are requesting a temporary street closure and permission to sell alcohol during the event. The celebration is scheduled from 3:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. The requested street closure would begin Saturday at 9:00 a.m., with the roadway reopening on Sunday at 7:00 a.m. Alcohol sales are proposed from 3:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., with consumption ending at 11:00 p.m.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The City supports community events annually by providing services such as street closures, event set-up and logistics coordination, on-site public safety presence, and clean-up efforts during and after the event. The estimated City cost to provide staffing and clean-up services for an event of this size is approximately \$6,000.

The application for this event was submitted prior to the implementation of the updated fee schedule. Therefore, cost recovery will occur under the previous fee structure, which includes:

\$500 Street Closure Fee

Applicable permit fees (e.g., ABC authorization letter, Loudspeaker Permit)

As a result, full cost recovery is not anticipated under the prior fee schedule.

ALTERNATIVES:

Council may decide to deny the street closure and/or the request to sell alcohol. The event could proceed without these components, or the applicant may choose not to hold the event.



Subject: **Letter of Support for AB 1708 (Solache) – Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Program Access for All Cities**

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the submission of a letter of support for AB 1708 (Solache), a Cal Cities–sponsored bill that would create a consistent and equitable pathway for all California cities to access state homelessness funding through the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Grant program.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Since 2019, the State of California has administered the HHAP program as its primary flexible funding source for local homelessness response efforts. Under current law, HHAP funds are allocated directly to:

- Cities with populations over 300,000
- All 58 counties
- The 44 Continuums of Care (CoCs)

However, 469 small and medium-sized cities, those with populations under 300,000, do not have a guaranteed or consistent mechanism to access HHAP funds. These cities must rely on discretionary allocations from their regional CoC, which may or may not prioritize municipal applicants. As a result, many cities that invest significant General Fund resources into homelessness response lack access to the state’s flagship homelessness program.

Cal Cities has identified this gap as a major barrier to local governments’ ability to address homelessness effectively and equitably across the state.


FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no direct fiscal impact associated with submitting a letter of support. If enacted, AB 1708 could create future opportunities for the City to compete for and receive HHAP funding, potentially reducing reliance on the General Fund for homelessness-related programs.

ALTERNATIVES:

1. Take No Action:

The City Council may choose not to submit a letter of support for AB 1708. This option would forgo an opportunity to advocate for expanded access to state homelessness funding for small and medium-sized cities. Without legislative changes, the City would continue to rely on discretionary allocations from the regional Continuum of Care, with no guaranteed or consistent pathway to HHAP resources.



2. Provide Direction to Modify the Draft Support Letter:

The City Council may direct staff to revise the draft letter of support to reflect additional priorities, concerns, or local context before submission. Staff would return with an updated version consistent with Council direction.

3. Oppose or Remain Neutral on AB 1708:

The City Council may choose to oppose the bill or take a neutral position. This alternative would signal that the City does not wish to formally support changes to the HHAP allocation structure. Opposing or remaining neutral could limit the City’s role in statewide advocacy efforts to expand funding access for cities of all sizes.

The City of Brawley is pleased to support **AB 1708** (Solache), which would create a new pathway for cities with populations under 300,000 to access state homelessness funding.

Since 2019, the state's flagship homelessness grant program, the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Grant program, has provided direct funding to cities with populations over 300,000, all 58 counties, and the 44 Continuums of Care (CoC) across California.

This structure has left most cities without a consistent pathway to access HHAP funding, despite investing significant General Fund resources to prevent and reduce homelessness in their communities. AB 1708 would address this by creating a new opportunity for the 469 California cities with populations under 300,000 to apply for HHAP funding through their CoC.

Specifically, AB 1708 would require CoCs, before allocating funding to other subrecipients in their region, to accept applications for 30 days only from cities with populations under 300,000. This measure would strike a reasonable balance between access and accountability, requiring interested cities to commit to regionally coordinated action plans and adhere to state housing and encampment policies.

AB 1708 would also require CoCs to prioritize applications from cities that have existing partnerships with non-profits, other cities, or have already leveraged state and local funding for existing projects in their communities. This would ensure that limited state resources are deployed efficiently and deliver measurable results in reducing homelessness.

As a rural community in Imperial County, Brawley faces increasing homelessness challenges that strain limited local resources. Additional HHAP funding would allow the City to expand emergency shelter capacity, strengthen street outreach, and support housing navigation services for individuals who currently have few options for assistance. Funding would also help the City address encampments more effectively by pairing clean ups with service connections and long-term housing strategies rather than relying solely on enforcement.

Brawley has taken a proactive, collaborative approach to addressing homelessness despite not receiving direct HHAP funding. The City works closely with the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council, Imperial County Behavioral Health, local nonprofits, and faith-based organizations to coordinate outreach, referrals, and service delivery.

Police and Fire personnel regularly engage with unhoused residents through welfare checks, crisis response, and service connections, and the City participates in regional planning to improve data collection, expand shelter capacity, and strengthen cross-jurisdictional coordination.

The City has invested significant General Fund resources to support homelessness response, including outreach efforts, encampment cleanups, public safety impacts, and partnerships that help provide emergency shelter and transitional housing when resources allow. These investments reflect the City's commitment, but without a stable state funding source, they remain difficult to sustain.

As the Governor and the Legislature consider future investments in the HHAP program, it is important to ensure the program is structured to maximize its reach and impact. Providing all cities with a pathway to participate in HHAP would strengthen regional collaboration and ensure state resources are deployed where they can most effectively serve unhoused Californians.

Local governments are best positioned to identify the programs and partnerships that will have the greatest impact in our communities. AB 1708 recognizes this, creating a clearly defined opportunity for all cities to compete for state resources, so that communities of all sizes can have a meaningful role in the state's homelessness response efforts.

The League of California Cities is proud to **sponsor** your AB 1708 (Solache), which would create a new pathway for cities with populations under 300,000 to access state homelessness funding.

Since 2019, the state's flagship homelessness grant program, the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Grant program, has provided direct funding to cities with populations over 300,000, all 58 counties, and the 44 Continuums of Care (CoC) across California. AB 1708 would create a new opportunity for the other 469 California cities with populations under 300,000 that meet clear accountability requirements to apply for HHAP funding through their CoC.

Currently, HHAP applicants must submit regionally coordinated action plans to the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), identifying each jurisdiction's roles and responsibilities in addressing homelessness. While cities with populations under 300,000 may participate in these plans, direct recipients are encouraged, but not required, to allocate HHAP funding to those cities.

As a result, there is no requirement to meaningfully engage or allocate these critical resources to small and medium-sized cities. Many of these cities lack a clear and consistent pathway to access HHAP funding, even as they invest significant General Fund resources to prevent and reduce homelessness in their communities.

AB 1708 would address this by requiring CoCs, prior to allocating funding to other subrecipients in their region, to accept applications for a period of 30 days only from cities with populations under 300,000. To be eligible to apply, interested cities must commit to complying with their region's action plan, have a compliant housing element, and have an encampment policy consistent with administration guidance. Additionally, CoCs must prioritize applications from cities that have existing partnerships with non-profits, other cities, or have already leveraged state and local funding for existing projects in their communities.

Cities of all sizes are committed to addressing the homelessness crisis, and AB 1708 would strengthen the partnership between the state and California's cities to help ensure state investments continue to deliver measurable results. Prioritizing small and medium-sized cities as

HHAP subrecipients would bolster their efforts and enable even more people to access services and affordable housing.

According to a 2024 Cal Cities survey, nearly 90% of cities are investing their own general fund revenues to address homelessness, and 60% of cities have been unable to access HHAP funding as subrecipients. Nine in 10 cities are concerned about sustaining existing homelessness services over the long term, and 81% say inconsistent state funding has hindered their ability to address homelessness.

Cal Cities recognizes the impact of the HHAP program, which has placed more than 90,000 people into permanent housing since 2023. Cities of all sizes have consistently supported sustained funding for HHAP, even though most will never receive program funds, because they recognize its value in reducing homelessness statewide. As the Governor and the Legislature consider future investments in the program, it is important not only to sustain funding but also to ensure the program is structured to maximize its reach and impact. Providing all cities with a clear pathway to participate in HHAP would strengthen regional collaboration and accountability and ensure that state resources are deployed where they can most effectively serve unhoused Californians.

Local governments are best positioned to identify the programs and partnerships that will have the greatest impact in their communities. AB 1708 would create a clearly defined opportunity to compete for state resources and ensure that communities of all sizes have a meaningful role in the state's homelessness response efforts. AB 1708, Homeless, Housing Assistance, and Prevention Program (HHAP) Pathway for Cities

SUMMARY

AB 1708 would create a new pathway for cities with populations under 300,000 to access existing state homelessness funding while requiring clear accountability metrics aligned with the state's goals.

BACKGROUND

Since 2019, the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention Grant Program (HHAP) has provided direct and flexible state-funded grants to cities with populations over 300,000, all 58 counties, and the 44 Continuums of Care (CoCs) across California.

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) oversees the HHAP program. Funding is awarded to eligible jurisdictions through an annual application process and is allocated based on point-in-time counts.

42% of HHAP funding is distributed amongst the 14 cities with populations over 300,000. 28% of HHAP funding is distributed to California's 58 counties. The remaining 30% of HHAP funding is allocated to CoCs.

A CoC is a regional or local planning body that coordinates housing and services funding for homeless families and individuals, specific to the geographic needs of a region. There are 44 CoCs recognized by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development in California.

To be eligible for HHAP funding, CoCs, big cities and counties must submit a regionally coordinated action plan to HCD that identifies the specific roles and responsibilities of each jurisdiction in addressing homelessness. The plans are reflected in a memorandum of understanding (MOU) that commits each signatory to participate in and comply with the plans. Cities with populations under 300,000 may also sign the MOU and commit to complying with the plan. Counties are encouraged to allocate resources to smaller cities that elect to participate in the plan.

HHAP recipients, including CoCs, may expend HHAP funds directly or enter into agreements with subrecipients, such as nonprofit organizations or service providers, to carry out eligible HHAP activities.

Subrecipients operate programs or provide services using HHAP funds, and direct recipients are expected to oversee them to ensure compliance with HHAP program funding requirements.

SB 131 (Chapter 24, Statutes of 2025) provides a one-time \$500 million General Fund allocation for HHAP in the 2026-27 fiscal year. This planned funding will represent round seven of the program. With this funding, state General Fund support for HHAP since 2019-20 will total about \$5 billion.


SB 131 also requires that round seven funding be contingent on the enactment of future legislation that enhances accountability requirements for grantees, such as requiring local encampment policies consistent with administration guidance and demonstrating progress on housing-related performance metrics.

PROBLEM

Currently, only 14 of the state's 483 cities can access HHAP funding directly. There is no statutory requirement for direct HHAP recipients to equitably or meaningfully allocate funds to smaller cities in their region. As a result, many small and mid-sized cities lack a clear pathway to HHAP resources, even as they invest their own limited local dollars to address homelessness.

A 2024 League of California Cities survey of 205 cities across the state found that 60% of cities have been unable to access HHAP funding as subrecipients. 87% of cities have invested their own general fund revenues to address homelessness. 93% of cities are concerned about sustaining existing homelessness services over the long term, and 81% say inconsistent state funding has hindered their ability to address homelessness.

As the state continues to demand meaningful results in addressing homelessness across California, there needs

to be a pathway for cities of all sizes to access state funding to supplement the work they are already doing to support their unhoused residents.

SOLUTION

AB 1708 would require CoCs, prior to allocating funding to other subrecipients, to accept applications for a period of 30 days only from cities in their region with populations under 300,000.

To be eligible to apply, interested cities must adopt a resolution committing to comply with their region's regionally coordinated action plan, have a compliant housing element, and have an encampment policy consistent with administration guidance.

Additionally, CoCs must prioritize applications from cities that have existing partnerships with non-profits, other cities or have already leveraged state and local funding for existing projects in their communities.

Local governments can be trusted to identify which programs and projects would have the most meaningful impact in their communities, ensuring that state funding continues to have the greatest impact in our communities.

RECOMMENDATION:

Review of current capital improvement carryover projects and discussion of Fiscal Years 2026/27 to 2031/32 Preliminary Proposed Capital Improvement Program and Heavy Equipment.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The proposed Capital Improvement Program and Heavy Equipment budget has been developed with the input of Department Directors and Managers who will be available during the budget study sessions to answer questions regarding specific departmental requests or operational needs.

Carryover projects (Attachment 1) are current projects with funding that will be carried over to FY 2026/27 once the fiscal year 2025/26 financial audit is completed. There is a total of 23 carryover projects.

A five-year outlook (Attachment 2) is provided for long-term planning, however, only the first year (FY 2026/27) is included in the upcoming budget for funding. Future years are not budgeted. This year the city also included a list of Other Identified Projects, which could be potentially funded with grants and/or incorporated into future budget cycles depending on the availability of revenues.

The CIP budget will be incorporated into the Citywide Operating and Capital Improvement Budget. There will be subsequent meetings where changes to the CIP budget may be presented and/or incorporated into final recommended budget.

Additional programmed budget study sessions are as follows:

- March 17, 2026 - Study session focused on the General Fund.
- May 19, 2026 - Update to all funds and Capital Improvement Plan.
- June 2, 2026 - Updates to all funds and additional considerations.
- June 16, 2026 – Citywide budget adoption.

The annual budget is a puzzle put together to deliver city services to residents, business owners, and visitors alike. Community input is greatly appreciated and necessary to ensure an inclusive budget.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The preliminary Proposed Capital Improvement Program and Heavy Equipment budget includes a total of eighteen (23) carryover projects and thirty-two (34) new items anticipated to be funded with various revenue sources totaling \$ 26,093,202.



ALTERNATIVES:

City Council may request additional information on the Capital Improvement Program.
